





His Royal Majesty

Obi (Professor) Joseph Chike Edozien, C.F.R.

Joseph Chike Edozien, C.F.R., was born on July 28, 1925 at Asaba. He started his primary education at the Catholic School, Warri in 1933 and completed it in 1937. Between 1938 and 1941, His Royal Majesty. Obi (Professor) Chike Edozien, was at the Christ the King College Onitsha, for his post primary education. He attended the Higher College, Yaba, Lagos in 1942 and the Achimota School, Acera, Gold Ceast from 1942 to 1943.

His Royal Majesty was at the University College Dublin, Republic of Ireland, from 1944 to 1951, where he obtained in 1948 the B.Sc. Hons. Degree in Physiology. In 1958, he obtained the M.Sc. (NUI) in Physiology and in 1961, he bagged the M.B.B.Ch.B.A.O. (NUI) with honours, also from the famous University College, Dublin.

In 1954, Obi (Professor) Chike Edozien was admitted as a Member of the Royal Council of Physician, M.R.C.P. (Edinburgh). He became a Fellow of the Royal Council of Physician, F.R.C.P. (Edinburgh) in 1963. He was awarded the Honorary Doctorate Degree of Science, D.Sc. (Hon) of the University of Rio de Janciro, Brazil. He became a Fellow of the Royal Council of Pathologist. F.R.C. Path (London) in 1967, and in 1980, he was made a Fellow of the Nigeria Academy of Science (F.A.S.).

His Royal Majesty, Obi (Professor) Joseph Chike Edozien, has had varied work experience beginning with that of Lecturer in Clinical Biochemistry, Middlesex Hospital Medical School, University of London (1951–1952), Lecturer in Chemical Pathology University College, Ibadan (1952–1957), Senior Lecturer in Chemical Pathology, University College, Ibadan (1957–1961).

He was a Professor of Chemical Pathology, University of Ibadan and Dean, Faculty of Medicine, University of Ibadan (1961—1967). He was a Special Adviser on Higher Education to the Military Governor of Midwest Region of Nigeria from 1966—1967, Between 1967 and 1971, he served as Professor of Nutrition, Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Cambridge, Mass, USA. He was also, Professor and Chairman, Department of Nutrition, School of Public Health, University of North Carolina from 1971–1991. Between 1988—1991, His Royal Majesty was the Chairman, Governing Board, National Institute of Medical Research, Yaba, Lagos. From 1991 till the present day, he has been a Professor Emeritus of the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, NC, United States of America.

By the grace of the Almighty God, Professor Joseph Chike Edozien ascended the throne of his forelathers, when he was crowned as the Asagha of Asaba in 1991. He remains so till date.

A very versatile and brilliant academic, His Royal Majesty had served as the Chairman, Delta State Council of Traditional Rulers (1997 1999). He became a Justice of Peace (JP) in September, 1996, and was honoured with the distinguished award of the Commander of the Federal Republic (C.F.R.) in November, 2000.

He became the Chancellor of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta, in 2004. Prior to this he had served as the Chancellor of the University of Benin, Benin City, Edo State.

His Royal Majesty, Obi (Professor) Joseph Chike Edozien had served on several Advisory Committees of International agencies. Notable among which are the World Health Organization (WHO), Food and Agricultural Organisation (FAO), the United Nations Committee on the Application of Science and Technology for National Development as well as many other several Committee of American Government Agencies, concerned with Technical Assistance to developing countries, such as USIAD, etc.

He was the Chairman, Delta State Elders Forum that made recommendations on the resolution of the Warri crisis in 1997. He is currently, the Chairman of the Forum of Chancellors of Nigerian Universities.

He is happily married to Olori Modupe Edozien and the marriage is blessed with wonderful children.

hief Osayemi was born on June 7, 1945 at Abcokuta, where he had his primary and secondary education. He completed his secondary school education in 1962, with first division grade in the West African School Certificate.

He is a foremost accountant who is a member of many professional bodies. He became a member of the Chartered Institute of Cost Accountants, London (ICMA) in 1969 and an Associate of the same body (ACMA) in 1971. In 1975, he became an Associate of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Nigeria (ICAN) and rose to become a Fellow of the Institute (ICA) in 1981. He has also been an Associate of the Nigerian Institute of Anagement (ANIM) since 2001.

As a person who is interested in having a broad based knowledge, Chief Ayinde Otakar is Osavemi, at the peak of his professional career, enrolled as a student of Law in the University of Lagos and obtained a Bachelor of Law degree (LLB) in 2000. He became a Barrister at Law (BL) in 2001, having completed the Nigerian Law School programme. As if this was not enough, he went back to the University in 2006 to obtain a Master of Law Degree (LLM).

Apart from his academic pursuit. Chief Osayemi is a thorough breed professional who has undergone various advanced managerial training. In 1975, he took a course in Executive Management (LEP21) at the London Business School. He then proceeded to the Harvard Business School, Boston, Massachusens, USA for Advanced Management Programme (AMP112) in 1993.

Chief Osayemi's professional career soared as the Factory Accountant with Phillips Nigeria Limited between 1970 and 1973 and Chief Accountant, Vegetable Oils Nigeria Limited from 1975 to 1976. He joined Thomas Wyatt Nigeria Ple in 1976 as Group Accountant, from where, he rose to become the Company's Commercial Manager between 1979 and 1981; Financial Officesor from 1981 to 1986 and Managing Director in 1986, a post he held until his retirement from the company in 2006. He is presently a Director of the company.

Chief L.A.O. Osavemi has over time, occupied several positions both in the private and public sectors. Since 1986 he has held various posts in the Manufacturers' Association of Nigeria (MAN) including the Chairman, Paper Sector, the Chairman, Apapa Branch, the Vice President, Lagos Zone and the National Treasurer. Also between 1986 and 2006, he was a Member of the Governing Council of the Nigeria Employers Consultative Forum and President, Paper and Paper Board Manufacturers and Converters Association. In the public sector, between 2000 and 2003, he was a Member of the Governing Council of the Nigerian Shippers Council. In 2003, he became a Member of the Board of Directors of the Bank of Industry, a position which he holds to date. He was also appointed a Member of the Technical Committee of the West African Monetary Zone in 2007 and also a Member of the Steering Committee of the Vision 20: 2020 in 2009. These two positions he also holds to date.

His diligence, profound sense of duty and utmost dedication to any assignment he handles culminated in his appointment as Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of Governing Council of the Federal University of Agriculture, Absokuta, in June, 2009.

Chief L.A.O. Osayemi is happily married to Chief (Mrs) Olawayemisi A. Osayemi (Iya Ewe of Isaga) and the two are blessed with children.

#### 1.1 VICE CHANCELLOR'S REMARKS

#### UNIVERSITY EDUCATION AND NATIONAL GROWTH



#### 1.1.1 Introduction

Universities are supposed to be agents of development. Developing countries like Nigeria therefore need to employ higher education to drive her development. Before now, many countries of Africa set up Universities to provide manpower for the government Civil service. Today, there is a paradigm change. Graduates of our Universities should not look to the government for white-collar jobs. The graduates of today need to be re-oriented to be able to create jobs, promote development and be an agent of change for a better society.

#### 1.1.2 The Needs

Our Universities therefore need to equip our young people with the skills and competences that they need to meet the challenges of our new world drive by knowledge-economy. Today, it is the knowledge that you have, and not the natural resources, and what to do with knowledge that determines national and personal prosperity. It is therefore the responsibilities of universities to ensure the quality of our educational deliveries. At the Federal University of Agriculture, quality is one of our values. We are committed to the quality of our teachers, learning environment, our classrooms, and

we are ensuring that excellent learning outcomes are achieved in our programme.

We are employing information communication Technology (ICT) to meet our current challenges of massification we are committed to prudent management of funds; and the continuous improvement of our human capacity to fulfill our vision and mission.

#### 1.1.3 Access

A major challenge to university education in Nigeria is the access to university education. In 1993, the UNESCO Regional Office for Education in Africa presented a "beyond access agenda" which can be summarized to define access to university education as:

full and unfettered educational opportunity, devoid of all manners of exclusion, that which is crowned by successful learning and improved life chances for all classes of beneficiaries whose improved knowledge and skills, positive values and attitudes should contribute to reducing socio-economic inequities and poverty in the personal sense and the wider society.

This definition implies that access to university education is not just the physical entrance into university, but a meaningful access, which would include the quality of education provided in the universities and even the quality of the students to receive the education. The number of candidates who apply for admission into Nigerian universities through the Joint Admissions and Matriculations Board, JAMB, keeps increasing yearly, while the actual number admitted only slightly increase. According to figures from JAMB, in 2008, 957,452 candidates applied for admission into universities in Nigeria while only 120,181 actually got admitted, a very minute 12.55%. Also, in 2009, 149,965 candidates were admitted out of a total of 1,148,547 who applied for admissions that year, a very low 13.06%. Back home in FUNAAB, in 2011 a total of 20,865 candidates who obtained a minimum cut-off point of 180 marks and above in the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination, UTME, chose the

University as either first or second choice. However, the University could only offer 3,576 candidates provisional admissions; a not impressive 17.14%. The following year, 2012, only 3,637 candidates were offered provisional admissions from a pool of 48,709 candidates who had the required 180 marks and above in the UTME. This was only 7.47% admission. I dare postulate that this would be the trend in all the universities in the country. There are various reasons for this trend but the main ones are:

- Inadequate funding of universities, which has led to inadequate provision of learning \* infrastructure and institutional space for accommodation of students, office space and lecture rooms resulting in ultimate inability to admit a substantial number of students.
- The National Universities Commission, NUC, Carrying Capacity Policy, which stipulates the maximum student population for any university based on the available teaching - learning facilities. This policy limits the admission space available to each university.
- Admission Quota System, which demarcates access to university according to merit, locality or catchment area, and educationally less developed areas. These criteria could put some prospective university students at disadvantage, as admission is not based strictly on merit.
- The nexus between JAMB screening standards and University Post UTME Screening Standards, a controversial condition which affects admission into most Nigerian universities. Opponents of the Post-UTME screening see it as a major obstacle to prospective candidates' university admission. They are of the view that there are significant differences in terms of difficulty and syllabus content between the two screening bodies. However, universities suspect that the UTME is not a completely reliable yard stick to admit students, because over the years 'high fliers' in the UTME have been found wanting academically.

However, at FUNAAB, we constantly strive to improve on both the quality and number of our annual intake by constantly expanding our teaching and research facilities despite the searcity of funds.

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abcokuta is its tradition of excellence has continued to produce, through its endowed human and material resources quality graduates who are well skilled and adequately furnished with the comprehensive information required of them to fit into their chosen professions. The following achievements are landmarks of the University:

- \* Students' Enrolment increased significantly from 848 in 1988 to 11,624 in the 2011/2012 Session.
- \* Graduate output was 17 at the first graduation in 1989 while in the 2010/2011 Session is increase to 1,355. In terms of quality of degree, only 1 graduate had first class in the 1989/1990 Session, but in the 2010/2011 Session, 39 students came out with first class degrees. Since inception to the end of the 2011/2012 Session, a total of 14,875 students had graduated from the University.
- From an Academic Staff population of 36 in 1988, a population of 532 staff was recorded in 2012.
- \* Academic Programmes in the University increased from 18 at inception to 27 in 2012. It should be noted that the 13 Agricultural departments us well as 6 Veterinary Medicine departments count as one programme each. This implies that there are 45 departments presently in the University.
- All Academic Programmes in the University have been accredited by the National Universities Commission (NUC). Out of 27 programmes approved for the University, 19 have full accreditation—status, 2 have interim status and 6 are yet to mature for accreditation. The 6 programmes have been visited for Resource Verification and all approved to commence academic activities. The Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria, COREN recently awarded Full Accreditation to all the four Engineering Programmes in the University.
- The University made history by recording a score of 76.5%, carning a seven year full accreditation status from the first Institutional Accreditation exercise carried out by the NUC.
  - In the same vein, in the World Universities Web Ranking, FUNNAB was rated 2nd in Nigeria, 35th in Africa in January, 2012 as

against its ranking of 7th in Nigeria and 60th in Africa in July, 2011.

Several lecture theatres equipped with multimedia facilities have been built and are used as central facilities for teaching students. A recent addition is the 2000 scater lecture theatre, while a 2500 scater theatre is almost completed.

To enhance teaching and research, a new building complex was recently constructed for the College of Food Science and Human Ecology while a Phase II complex was completed for the College of Environmental Resources Management.

#### 1.2 BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta is one of the three specialized Universities of Agriculture in Nigeria. It was established by the Federal Government in January, 1988, its foundation day being the 28th of January, 1988. The establishment of the Universities of Agriculture was an entirely new concept for promoting agricultural education and services for agricultural development and attainment of self-sufficiency in food and fibre in Nigeria.

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abcokuta staned at its mini campus in Isale-Igbebit, in the centre of Abeokuta, the capital of Ogun State. The University issoved in October, 1995 to its permanent site, which is located next to the Ogun-Osun River Basin Development Authority (OORBDA), off the Abeokuta-Ibadan road in the North-Eastern end of the city. The University started with 5 Colleges and 20 Academic Departments.

The pioneer Vice-Chancellor was Professor Nurudeen Olorunnimbe Adedipe, a professor of Plant Physiology who assumed duty as Vice-Chancellor on the foundation day. Professor N. O. Adedipe was succeeded by Professor Julius Amioba Okojie, a professor of Forest Management & Biometrics. Professor J. A. Okojie is currently the Executive Secretary, National Universities Commission, Abuja. The exit of Professor J. A. Okojie as Vice-Chancellor of FUNAAB brought in Professor Isaac Folorunsho Adu, a successful

professor of Small Ruminant Production who came into office in September 2001. A short interegrum brought in an Acting Vice-Chancellor in person of Professor Ishola Adamson, a Professor of Biochemistry between August, 2006 and May, 2007. The immediate past Vice-Chancellor, Professor Oluwafemi Olaiya Balogun, a professor of Animal Biochemistry and Nutrition was appointed the fourth Vice-Chancellor on 24th May, 2007 and his tenure witnessed a remarkable leap in terms of infrastructural development in the University. Presently, the Vice-Chancellor of the University is Professor Olusola Bandele Ovewole, a seasoned professor of Food Science, assumed duty as the fifth substantive Vice-Chancellor of this great University on 24th May, 2012. The University has since his assumption in office witnessed qualitative leadership, great drive towards making the Institution a world class university in addition to unperturbed peace and tranquillity. These great icons created indelible marks on the face of this unique institution.

The University had from its inception consistently witnessed tremendous and remarkable growth and development under its past and present Vice-Chancellors who have immeasurably contributed to setting the institution on a landmark of success. In 2002, the University won its first major award by being adjudged the best overall University in Nigeria in terms of organisation and quality of The University won the best programmes. specialized University award and the then Vice-Chancellor, Professor L. F. Adu won the best Vice-Chancellor award in Nigeria. The University in addition won the maiden edition of research fair organised by the National Universities Commission (NUC) in 2004.

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta in its tradition of excellence has continued to produce, through its endowed human and material resources quality graduates who are well skiiled and adequately furnished with the comprehensive information required for engaging in economic agricultural production. To date, the University has produced a total number of 14,875 graduates. Presently, there are 9 Colleges in the University and 45 Academic Departments.

#### 2.0 ACADEMIC MATTERS


#### 2.1 SENATE ACTIVITIES

In doing this, the Senate which is under the Chairmanship of the Vice-chancellor, oversees and ensures that the tripodal mandate of the University which are: Teaching Research and Extension Services, are implemented in a sustainable manner.

#### 2.2 ADMISSION EXERCISE


Admission process for the undergraduate programmes was conducted in line with the regulations of the Joint Admission and Matriculation Board (JAMB) that candidates that have minimum scores in the Universal Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) be given opportunity to be screened for admission. Computer Based Test was used for the Post Universal Tertiary Matriculation Examination (PUTME). Scores of candidates in the UTME, PUTME and the aggregated results in the Secondary School Certificate Examination (SSCE) in the proportion 50, 30 and 20% respectively were used to determine admission and placements. The National Universities Commission (NUC) approved carrying capacity and National guidelines for admission viz: 45% on merit 35% catchinent areas and 20% for the Education Less Disadvantage States comprising all the Northern States, Cross River State, Ebonyi and Bayelsa State, were complied with The postgraduate programmes admission was done in conformity with the approved regulations governing postgraduate school.

#### 2.3 STUDENT ENROLMENT

Table 2 shows the number of candidates that choice FUNAAB as their first choice, the NUC quota and the number of candidates that were offered admission. The University admitted less than NUC admission quota for the period under review.




Figure 1: Students' Enrolment by Mode of Study in Percentage for 2011/2012 Academic Session

#### 2.4 ACCREDITATION

There are 27 programmes which is equivalent to 45 departments in the University, out of which one is a service department, and seven new programmes. The NUC had conducted the resource verification for the new programmes while their accreditation will be statutorily conducted when the students in the programmes get to the higher level.




Figure 2: Accreditation Status of Programmes in the University

All degree awarding programmes in the University have NUC full accreditation status with the exception of Civil Engineering and Electrical/Electronic Engineering with interim accreditation status and these two programmes are due for the NUC re-accreditation in 2012. All the four programmes in the College of Engineering were visited during the review year by the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN) and were all awarded Full Accreditation Status. Table 5 and Figure 2 show the NUC accreditation status of all the programmes in the University.

#### 2.5 EXAMINATIONS

The semester examinations are taken with all seriousness in the University towards the success of which some Units Centres Departments play significant roles as highlighted below:

- Time-Table and Examination Committee, TIMTHC: Prepared the Time-Table, Invigilation Roster, allocation of venues for essay and commuter based examinations, organised and coordinated invigilation of examination. The Committee also attended to any emergency during examination.
- Academic Planning Unit, APU: Distributed examination materials like envelopes, mark sheets, attendance sheets, risograph consumables, etc to the departments. The Unit also determined the quantum of funds needed for examinations and helped in their allocation to all departments in University.
- Environmental Management Unit, EMU: Provided adequate security of lives and properties, good sanitary conditions within and outside examination halfs and assisted in immediate handling of cases of misconduct during examination.
- Management Committee on Transportation, MANCOT: Effectively and efficiently provided buses for the conveyance of students during examination.
- Information and Communication Technology Resource Centre, ICTREC: Made students' academic
  data available for allocation of courses and students to examination venues and also provided
  technical assistance especially for e-examination
- iii. Health Services: Provided Ambulances for the conveyances of students who fell sick in the examination hall to Health Centre for prompt medical attention and also treated those who took ill that were brought to Health Centre.

- vi. Work and Service Department: Ensured regular water and electric power supply to the examination venues. The Department also replaced and repaired electrical gadgets and other infrastructures during examination periods.
- Vii. University Management: Provided necessary human resources, funds, logistics and infrastructures required for the success of the examination.

#### 2.6 GRADUATE OUTPUT

Within the period under review, the University produced 1,681 graduates. 26 bagged first class honours degree, 541 second class upper, 881 with second class lower, 201 third class, 12 pass degree while 20 were unclassified degree (Pass). In 2011/2012 session, the University turned out 36 Ph.D, 124 Masters degree and 37 Postgraduate Diploma in various disciplines. The breakdown of the degree awarded is as presented in the tables below.




Figure 3: FUNAAB First Degree Graduate Output from 2006/2007 to 2011/2012 Academic Session




Figure 4: Postgraduate Student Output by College for 2011/2012 Academic Session




Figure 5: FUNAAB Graduation Profile for 2011/2012 Academic Session




Figure 6: Academic Staff by Rank and Gender as at September, 2012




Figure 7: Pyramidal Structure of Academic Staff as at September, 2012




Figure 8: Senior Non-Teaching Staff as at September, 2012




Figure 9: Junior Non-Teaching Staff as at September, 2012




Figure 10: Percentage Distribution of Non-Teaching Staff by Cadre and Gender as at September, 2012




Figure 11: Staff by Category for 2011/2012 Academic Session

#### 2.8 GENDER MAINSTREAMING

# 2.9 QUALITYASSURANCE

The vision of the Federal University Agriculture, Abcokuta is to evolve as a foremost institution in the triad a teaching, research and extension by attracting, managing and retaining appropriate human and material resources for the pursuit of the desired creative, imaginative and innovative change for sustainable agriculture and rendevelopment in Nigeria.

To foster a culture of high quality assurance in all programmes, the University has developed a mechanism; i framework for a continuous quality management and control of which all the stakeholders have to align their activities with the University's vision and mission of excellence. Parts of the mechanism put in place are;

- Admission to the University have been regulated over the years in line with the approved carrying capacitgiven by the National Universities Commission (NUC) and Joint Admission Matriculation Board (JAMB)
- There is a Post Universities and Tertiary Matriculation Examination for those who picked the University either as first or second choice and scored a minimum requirement for the University Admission. The idea is to screen and audit the best of all the candidates. Futhermore, the University still conduct screening exercise to have one on one interaction with the candidates in our bid to bring the best not only academically but also morally.
- The University follows, as a matter of policy the statutory requirements of establishing programmes before commencement. Resource verification is usually conducted and structures put in place before admitting students into new programmes.
- \* The staff mix in all programmes was adjudged as one of the best in the country, about 80% of the department are being headed by Professors. All the programmes in the University have full accreditation status exceptions ones that are statutority due in few years time for accreditation because they are relatively new.
- \* The Student-Teacher Ratio is modestly one of the best in the country. Our Veterinary Medicine has the ratio of 1:10 against the NUC requirement of 1:10. The Engineering College has the ratio of 1:10 against NUC requirement of 1:15. The University had been adjudged one of the best in Nigeria several times due to or quality and excellence.
- The big lecture theatres have multimedia projectors, public address systems and interactive boards for good audio-visual performance.
- On semester basis, students are given the apportunity to assess the performance of their leachers and facilitie through administered Student Evaluation Questionnaires. This, no doubt has been an impetus for bend performance by the lecturers.
- \* The Academic Planning Unit, as part of her internal mechanism of ensuring quality assurance, conducts Interim Accreditation for all programmes prior to any accreditation exercise which has made accreditation exercises by the NUC and other regulatory bodies like COREN easy at any time the bodies visit.

- The whole programmes in the University are being guided by approved framework of the NUC Benchmark Minimum Accreditation Standard.
- The environment of the University is serene compared to what obtains in some of the best Universities in the World. The network of intra-campus roads is excellent and our Library is adjudged one of the best in the country. The green and screne environment is conducive for learning.

# 210 THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY



Nimbe Adedipe Library

The Federal University of Agriculture Library, named after the pioneer Vice-Chancellor Professor 'Nimbe Adedpe, is centrally located on the crest of a hill at the centre of the University. Thus, it commands a very goodview of the whole campus thereby making it visible from all sides. There are also four College libraries in operation, located at the College of Natural Sciences (COLNAS), the College of Engineering (COLENG), College of Veterinary Medicine (COLVET), and College of Management Sciences (COLMAS). The other five Colleges are in the process of establishing their own libraries.

The University Library continues to surprove on the acquisition of e-journals and e-books, and also improves on the currency of books in prints. Some of the achievements of the library during the period under review include:

In reaching out to its users, the library embarks on marketing of library products from time to time. One of such programmes was the books exhibition in various Colleges of the University tagged "Ask your Librarian" (16" -18" November 2011). This is an enlightenment campaign to further expose the users to library operations and to encourage them to use the library.

- Daily provision of current awareness information display of captions of current information (politics, health, sports, etc) from the daily newspapers on library billboard, which encourages patronage of the library by the users.
- Create a library porter <u>www.unaablibrary.org</u> that allows for users interaction with the system
  while the e-journals, e-books and e-magazines downloaded could be accessed 24:7 offline as
  the need arises.
- Attraction of book donations to the library by local and international donors including:
  - 19,000 volumes of books received from a donor agency 'Book for Africa' based in United State of America.
  - 57 cartoons received from Ceezek foundation based in United State of America.
  - 449 volumes of text books from Prof. Tokunbo Taiwo of College of Natural Sciences
  - 630 volumes of books from Prof. Nimbe Adedipe The Pioncer Vice-Chancellor
- A total sum of thirty million Naira (N30m) Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) was approved for the procurement of books, journals laptops computers, library furniture and equipments.
- Establishment of an c-Library with the acquisition of 72 wireless computers
- Sponsorship of Staff for training/development and professional conferences locally and abroad
- Creation of 2 College Libraries (i.e. at the College of Veterinary Medicine and the College of Natural Sciences)
- Establishment of library at the University Institute for Human Resources Development (INHURD)
- Creation of Nimbe Adedipe Agricultural Research Collection

# 3.0 RESEARCH, GRANTS AND PUBLICATIONS

#### 3.1 RESEARCH

Research is one of the three tripodal functions of the University. To this effect, the University is seriously involved in research activities to address many problems plaguing our agricultural and other production sectors. During the year under review, the University empowered the Institute of Food Security, Environmental Resources and Agricultural Research (IFSERAR), which is mainly responsible for the core research activities of the University, with a sum of Five Million Naira (NS,000,000,00). IFSERAR funded six (6) different research projects with this money. The Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) also injected a sum of Ten Million Naira (N10,000,000,00) to finance staff research work during the session.

The University has recorded some breakthrough through its research activities. For example, IESERAR patented two (2) dual purpose rice varieties named FFUNAABOR-1 (OFADA GOLD) and FFUNAABOR-2 (OFADA WHITE) in December, 2011.

#### 3.2 GRANTS AND AWARDS

The University Management in its efforts to ensure that FUNAAB meets global standards and expectations of donors for accountability, transparency, with effective management of research funds for maximum impact, established the Directorate of Grants Management (DGM) in February, 2012. The DGM was thus poised to facilitate research efforts of FUNAAB staff through applications for grants and fellowships, the negotiation of grants contracts and administration of research funds.

The goal of the DGM is to encourage quality research in the University in line with its vision to be a centre of excellence in knowledge generation for global development and the sustenance of an environmentally friendly society. This is in addition to strengthening research and scholarship by staff and students in all areas that will benefit the society at the local, national and global levels.

#### The mandates given to the DGM include:

- To develop a Research Policy for the University and provide regular monitoring and evaluation of the research activities in the University.
- To manage the University's internal research funds as well as any external funds made available for research.
- To organize appropriate training programmes from time to time for the University research community that will enhance research management and competitiveness, for grants to meet the requirements of funding agencies.
- 4. To monitor all research activities associated with the University and facilitate ethical conduct of research including financial accountability and administration of grants and research related contracts.
- To promote the publicity and feasibility of research activities in the University through the
  publication of the University Amoud Research reports and other publications that will
  show-case research excellence in the University.

The DGM is structured into five (5) units namely, Research Development and Policy Unit; Research Ethics and Integrity Unit; Research Links Unit; Legal Unit and Finance Unit.




Figure 12: Number of National, Regional and International Publications by Colleges







# 3.5 LECTURES, CONFERENCES, WORKSHOP AND SEMINAR

The University takes the issue of staff development seriously, thus the importance it places or conference/training attendance by its staff. The University encourages academic staff in particular, to present the results of their researches at local and international conferences. In the year under review, thirty five (35) Staff benefited from FUNAAB Staff Capacity Building/ Training overseas. Also, twenty one (21) Staff members secured TETFund Conference grant approval. Eleven (11) staff are currently benefiting from TETFund Academic Staff Training and Development (AST & D) Intervention. In addition, the University supported several academic and non-academic Staff to attend local conferences.

Many International Conferences, Workshops and Seminars were hosted by Federal University of Agriculture between 2011 and 2012, some of which are presented in Table 13.







# 4.0 COMMUNITY/ACADEMIC SUPPORTS SERVICES

#### 4.1 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The University Information Communication Technology and Resource Centre (ICTREC) underwent a dramatic change in orientation, policy and philosophy of delivery of most elements of this rapidly changing essential tool for the delivery of the tripartite mandate of the University in tems of teaching, research and extension designed to facilitate learning during the review year. The Centre made tremendous progress during the review year noticeable among which were recorded in the essential areas in the Management Information System Unit, Campus Network Development and Management Unit, Training and ICT Help Desk Unit, Project Development Unit, Open Users, System Maintenance Unit, and in the Multimedia Development and Instructional Technology Unit.

A new development in the deployment of instructional technology is the extensive monitoring of the e-exams through CCTV camerus which are directed at a widescreen LCD monitors in the two centres for students examination. With this implementation student cheating and other examination malpractices were reduced to the barest minimum.

### Web Ranking

The University has continued to move up on the World Universities Web Ranking by emerging 7° position in Nigeria, 60° in Africa and 4,833° in the World as at July, 2011. The Webometries Centre established by the University has been enriching the web content of the Institution. This task was made easy by the tremendous improvement in learning, research and extension parameters of the University, which translated into the remarkable ranking of the University as FUNNAB was rated 2° in Nigeria, 35° in Africa in January, 2012.

# 42 COMMUNITY-BASED FARMING SCHEME (COBFAS)

In December 2010, the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta established the Community-Based Farming Scheme (COBFAS) as a way of bringing the Bachelor of Agriculture (B. Agric.) students close to the realities and practice of agriculture in Nigeria. It is in the wisdom of the University that the students should have a first-hand training and experience in communities where Nigerian farmors reside and practice farming within the same socio-economic system where the farmers operate. The overall aim is to stimulate the students' interest in agriculture and motivate them to take up agriculture as a career and be integrated into the Nigerian rural setting where they will practice agriculture upon graduation.

To achieve this, the University extended the six months Farm Practical Year (FPY) training programme for B.Agric, students to a

one-year programme at the penultimate year. This affords the student-trainees, the opportunity to live and work on the farm in rural communities. The University started-off COBFAS in four communities namely Isaga-Orile, Odogbolu, Ode-Lemo and Iwoye-Ketu located at four geopolitical zones of Ogun State.

The vision of the programme is to produce highly skilled manpower that will drive the economy in the rural communities in Nigeria through agriculture for sustainable development and food security. The mission is to contribute to sound training of agricultural students toward building great future modern farmers for sustainable development in line with the mission of Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta.

The objectives of the programme are to:

- Train and build the capacity of young agricultural undergraduates for improved and sustainable increase in agricultural production and productivity.
- Produce generation of modern farmers that are willing to take up agriculture as businessin the rural communities and impact positively on the lives of the communities.
- iii. Accelerate agricultural commercialization and agro-industrial development in the communities.
- Create job opportunities for youths in the rural communities and encouraging them to take up agriculture as a business.
- Promote natural resource management/organic agriculture.
- Achieve Universal food security and protect vulnerable households from hunger and abject poverty.
- vii. Contribute to food security and reduce poverty in the selected communities.
- viii. Make the impact of the University felt in the selected communities.

The components of the scheme include the following:

- Development of rain-fed and irrigated crop farming;
- Livestock farming;
- Institutional support and strengthening;
- Processing, packaging and marketing strategies and
- e. Training and human capital development.

Since inception, COBFAS has made tremendous achievements in the areas of training and entrepreneurship development of students and this has impacted greatly on the host communities. The impacts of the establishment of COBFAS in the four locations on the communities include by not limited to the followings:

- Employment opportunities for the youths of the communities
- ii. Advocating for best agricultural practices among host communities
- iii. Improvement in the rural economies
- iv. Increased agricultural output in the communities
- Facilitation of improved social amenities and infrastructure in the communities
- vi. Opportunity for university education for the youths in the various communities
- vii. Mentoring of the young people in the communities
- viii. Improved environmental sanitations in the communities

# 4.3 AGRICULTURAL MEDIA RESOURCES AND EXTENSION CENTRE (AMREC)

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta, in her quest to offer an adequate public and institutional support to farmers and investor, established in 1991, the Agricultural Media Resources and Extension Centre (AMREC). The Centre operates through Model Extension Villager

- (a) by testing latent agricultural technologies available for the zing (South-West)
- (b) by acting as study villages on extension models
- (c) by training of students in practical extension

The Centre has been pro-active and played participatory roles in knowledge/information initiation in the past years, by facilitating murally meaningful and knowledge-based implementation of projects amon primary producers, private sector practitioners as well as researchers.

Some of the activities/projects carried out by the Centre during the year under review include:

- Cupacity-building on Fish farming for ten (10) Secondary Schools in Ogun State.
- Honey bee-rearing through establishment of Demonstration Apiary
- Establishment of Small Plot Adoption Technique (SPAT) for Organic Maize Production
- Establishment and maintenance of 3-hectare Cassava Multiplication Plot under the C: AVA project.
- Provision of processing equipments (hydraulic press) to build the Capacities of C:AVA projet beneficiaries (processors' groups at Adae and Olorunda communities in Ogun state)
- Presentation of twenty (20) Knapsack Sprayers and 40 fermentation Vits to C:AVA project beneficiaries across 25 communities in Ogun State.
- Business Development Training on Cassava Production and Processing for C:AVA project beneficiaries
- Capacity Building Training for farmers in FUNAAB neighbouring communities on Dry Sessel Profitable Vegetable Production at Ojoo-Oluwo community.
- Implementation of NESTLE-FUNAAB Farm Family Health Project (FFAHEP) Extension Outreache in Ogun and Lagos States.
- Adult Literacy Programme for farmers in FUNAAB neighbourhood villages at AMREC/FUNAAB Alagbede Adult Literacy and graduation of the 2nd set.
- Capacitybuilding & Family Health Education on Reproductive Health and Parenting for Families in FUNAAB Neighbourhood (Kofesu-Alaro, Alaghede, Ojoo-Oluwo, and Owe and Kangel Ogijum, Ijemo-Fadipe, in Odeda LGA and Imala in Abcokuta North LGA.

- Establishment and Maintenance of 2-hectare Cassava Demonstration Farm



### 4.4 UNIVERSITY SCHOOL



#### 5.3 STAFF PROMOTION

The College of Agricultural Management and Rural Development (COLAMRUD) was established to support FUNAAB tripodad mandate of teaching, research and extension services in the areas of agricultural economics, Jann management, agricultural extension, rural development and agricultural administration. One of its departments is also responsible for teaching the General Studies courses to all undergraduate students in the University.

As at the end of 2011/2012 academic session, the College had a total of 55 academic staff and 22 non-academic staff, with the student enrolment standing at 1,172. These include 970 undergraduate students and 202 postgraduate students.

# Training Output




Figure 13: Distribution of COLAMRUD 2010 - 2012 Graduate Output by Degree

Between 2009/2010 and 2011/2012 academic sessions, the College successfully presented a total of 403 candidates (Figure 13) for the award of B.Agric Degree - 208 in Agricultural Economics and Farm Management option and 195 in Agricultural Extension & Rural Development option. In addition, 18 candidates were presented for the award of Postgraduate Diploma, 33 for the award of M.B.A. Agribusiness, 85 for M.Agric/M.Sc. and 17 for PhD Degree in various specialty areas of Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Extension and Communication Studies.

# Research Outputs

A total of 350 articles were published by College members in COLAMRUD between 2010 and 2012. About two-third (63.7%) of these were published in refereed journals and the rest in conference proceedings. Majority (52.3%) were published in outlets that have international readership.

The College organised two Lecture Series during the period under review: the first titled Persistence of Agricultural Formalism in Nigeria: Towards a situated radicalization of agricultural systems was presented by Professor P.A. Okuneye, while the Second, titled Acquiring Good Education for What?: Opportunity Structures and Motivational Perspectives on the Declining Standard of Education in Nigeria was presented by Professor Bolanie Akcredolu-Alc. The Dean, Professor S.O. Apantaku also presented the lead paper, titled Assessment of the Participatory Research Methods Among Researchers in Nigerian Agriculture Universities at the 7th Annual FUTA Agricultural Conference on November 7, 2011.

# Grants, Awards, Linkages and Partnership

An AEFM team lead by Professor P.A. Okuncyc was awarded the Agricultural Research Council of Nigeria (ARCN). Competitive Agricultural Research Grant Scheme (CARGS) worth N14,909,550.00 in 2011 to prosecute a research titled "Economic Evaluation and Impact Assessment of Food Crop Production, Processing and Storage Technologies in Nigeria.

Professor Wale Dipcolu, Dr Kolawole Adebayo and Dr Idris Ayinde were active members of the multinational team implementing the Cassava: Adding Value for Africa (C:AVA) project funded to the tune of US\$16 million by the Bill and Melinda Gate Foundation. The project was initiated in 2008 to develop value chains for High Quality Cassava Flour (HQCF) in Ghana.

Tanzania, Liganda, Nigeria and Malawi, and to improve the livelihoods and incomes of at least 90,000 smallholder households as direct beneficiaries.

Dr Kolawole Adebayo is also a member of the multinational team that won a EUR 3 million research grant from the European Union to finance the project - Gains from Losses in Rost and Tubers (GRATITUDE) aimed at reducing post-harvest losses in cassava and yam. He is also a member of the team that won a EUR 3 million research grant from the European Union to implement the project CassavaGmarket aimed at empowering smallholder farmers in the access to markets enable farmers to generate cash income from selling produce at markets leading to greater stability of income and increased agricultural production diversity.

The Department of Agricultural Administration (AGAD) won a LEADHER Learning Visit Grant in collaboration with University of Ghana in 2012. Dr Oluwakemi Fapojuwo and Dr Petra AbdulSalam-Saghir also won two year African Women in Agricultural Research and Development (AWARD) Post-Doctoral Fellowship during the period under review Similarly, Mr Dare Akerele won the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund) Scholarship to pursue PhD programme at University of Readings, UK while Mr C.I. Alarima also won a Japanese Government Scholarship to pursue PhD programme at Shimane University, Japan during the period under review.

# (22 COLLEGE OF ANIMAL SCIENCE AND LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION (COLANIM)




Figure 14: Distribution of Undergraduate Students\* Enrolment by Departments for 2010/2011 and 2011/2012

The College of Animal Science and Livestock Production (COLANIM) was created in 1988 out of the then School of Technology of the old College of Science and Technology, Abeoleuta and currently contributes to the B. Agric. Programme through its five academic Departments namely: Animal Breeding and Genetics (ABG), Animal Nutrition (ANN), Animal Physiology (ANP), Animal Production and Health (APH), and Pasture and Range Management (PRM). The College has a total of 87 staff comprising 60 academic staff in the entire cadre, 21 non-teaching staff and 6 academic Technologist. Undergraduate student enrolment was 1,751 and 2,053 in 2010/2011 and 2011/2012 academic session respectively (Figure 14).




Figure 15: Distribution of COLANIM Graduate Output by Departments from 2010 to 2012

Within the period 2010 to 2012, the College presented a total of 730 students (Figure 15) for the award of B. Agric. degree in Animal Breeding and Genetics (159), Animal Nutrition (175), Animal Physiology (64), Animal Production and Health (209), and Pasture and Range Management (123). In addition, 91 postgraduate students were presented for the award of Postgraduate Diploma (3), M. Agric. (70) and PhD (18) degrees in the period 2010 to 2011.

### Research Output


### Grants and Awards






### STAFFPROMOTION

The Department of Environmental Management and Toxicology is unique in the Nigerian University System as it was

the first Department in the country to award a degree in Environmental Management and Toxicology.

The Department of Aquaculture and Fisheries Management became operational in 1992 after the University had ensured that the minimum standards prescribed by the NUC for new programmes had been met.

The Department of Agrometeorology and Water Management changed its name in the year 2002 to Department of Water Resources Management and Agrometeorology. The College currently has four Departments namely:

- Department of Aquaculture and Fisheries Management
- Department of Environmental Management and Toxicology
- Department of Forestry and Wildlife Management
- Department of Water Resources Management and Agrometeorology

### PHILOSOPHY AND OBJECTIVES

The primary philosophy guiding the training of students is the production of highly skilled manpower in all areas of specializations of Environmental Resources Management. The main objective of the programmes in the College is to provide practically and theoretically sound manpower that will not only be job creators, but also serve as sources of manpower for:







methods for tomato production.


### Staff Promotion

# THE COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

The College of Veterinary Medicine (COLVET) is one of the two Colleges slated for the second phase of development of the University. It took off with the admission of the first set of 100 level students into the six-year Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree programme in the 2001/2002 session.

# GENERAL PHILOSOPHY AND OBJECTIVES

The general philosophy of the College is to produce

skilled manpower that is adequately furnished with comprehensive information required for engaging in economic livestock production, animal health, public health, research and teaching, and to produce veterinarians who will be job creators rather than job seekers.

# The objectives of the College are:

- To provide adequate training that will enable recipients facilitate production of wholesome meat, dairy and poultry products and promote public health.
- (ii) To equip trainces with knowledge and skill for teaching, research and public service functions.

The DVM degree curriculum consists of two parts: the pre-professional phase of two semesters (100 level) and the professional phase of ten semesters (200-600 level). The professional phase includes the pre-clinical phase, para-clinical phase and the clinical phase.

The College has a Veterinary Teaching Hospital and the following six Departments:

- Department of Veterinary Anatomy

Professor Dipeolu who is a member of the VCN is also an elected member of the Board of Colleges of Veterinary Surgeons of Nigeria where she is contributing to the development of Veterinary Medicine in Nigeria.

# Pre-Degree Science Programme

The Pre-Degree Science Programme is a full-time preinstriculation training designed to prepare students for various degree programmes in agriculture, engineering and sciences of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta.

# Pre-Degree Management Sciences Programme

The Pre-Degree Management Programme is a full-time pre-matriculation training designed to prepare students for various degree programmes in management sciences of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokula. Academic activities started on the programme in 2011.

- The Foundation Science Programmme (FSP) started in October, 2006 after the Diploma Programme (DICEP) was discontinued. The programme has also been replaced by Cambridge A\*Level.
- Part-Time Degree Programme (PTDP)

The programme, a non-residential one, was established in the year 2007 with lectures holding at the Main campus of the University. It runs for one year over and above the number of years for the regular programmes.

- Agricultural Mechanization Research Programme
- 2 Aquaculture and Fisheries Research Programme
- 3. Biosciences Research Programme
- 4 Crop Production Research Programme
- Environmental Resources and Conservation Research Programme
- Food and Nutrition Research Programme
- Food Security and Socioeconomic Research Programme

# 8. Livestock Research Programme

Research agenda were prepared to address among other things problems identified through the diagnostic survey. Thereafter, there was a Call for Proposals in 2010 which generated considerable interest within the University's Academic Staff and several research topics were submitted. Fifty-two Multi-disciplinary Research Projects which spread over the 8 Research Programmes were eventually selected and awarded Grants totalling N17,000,000.00.

The 2nd year of IFSERAR (2011) was one of consolidation as the Institute grappled with the setting up of physical facilities and infrastructure, staffing and optimization of the utilization of scarce financial resources. There were notable achievements made possible by the Vice-Chancellor's intervention and the pioneering doggedness of the Institute's staff and Programme Leaders, as well as a number of Researchers from the Colleges.

The 2011/2012 academic session was particularly eventful for IFSERAR for the following reasons, among others:

- Successful Field Visit by National Variety Release Committee and other relevant agencies to collaborating. Farmers' Farms in Ogun State on the Ofada Rice Project.
- Stocking of Aquaculture Ponds with fingerlings following the impounding of water at the IFSERAR Dam
- Commencement of turkey production by IFSERAR at O-ORBDA site
- Completion of Draft Manual for Agricultural Statistics, and
- Receipt of Import Permit from the Federal Government for the importation of Kalahari Red Goats from South Africa.

During the year under review an additional 30 ha of land was cleared at II/SERAR Farm bringing the total cleared so far to 77 ha. The Aquaculture and Fisheries Research Programme constructed a 3-ha reservoir while the Crop Production Research Programme constructed maize crib. The Kalahari Red Goat Project of the Livestock Production Research Programme was able to establish 16 ha of paddocks, construct a Project Office block and a Goat House. The Biosciences Research Programme continued with the construction of its field facilities while the Environmental Resources and Conservation Research Programme continued with the

construction of its field facilities. Additional computers and high performance printers were also acquired. The University allocated a 14-seater bus to the Institute, which has led to improvement in logistics. Thirty-two (32) research projects were funded by ETF in 2011 at a total cost of N10,000,000. Eighty-five percent of the research grants have been released to the Research Team Leaders as at May 30, 2012.

### Seminars and Workshops

IFSERAR University-wide Lecture Series, No. 2, titled "Enhancing the Potential of the Academia through Intellectual Property" was delivered by Engr. (Dr.) Umar B. Bindir, Director-General, NOTAP, Federal Ministry of Science & Technology, Abuja, on June 2, 2011.

A Workshop titled "Framework for Agricultural Statistics in IFSERAR Mandate States" was held on Tuesday, June 14, 2011. Arising from this, a Committee Chaired by the Head of the Department of Statistics, FUNAAB, was set up to develop a Manual for the collection of agricultural statistics in Nigeria.

IFSERAR also co-sponsored a Training Workshop on DNA Fingerprinting in collaboration with the FUNAAB Genomic Group. The programme is currently on.

Dr. Bello of Livestock Research Programme was sponsored for a Training Workshop in Genomics at the FUNAAB Biotechnology Centre early in July, 2011, Dr. (Mrs.) Taiwo also attended a Workshop on Patents Information at Abuja from July, 2011.

IFSERAR recorded significant progress in 2011, laying the foundation for future achievements. The support and funding by the University and ETF, cooperation of Stakeholders, as well as the collaborative efforts of staff of all cadres across the University are all gratefully acknowledged.

# 6.5 Centre for international LZATION and partnerships (CENIP)



### INTRODUCTION

Directorate of Linkages and Partnerships was re-established on September 17, 2007, after a year-long merger with the University Research and Development Centre and was

later transformed into what is now known as the Centre for Internationalisation and Partnerships (CENIP) by the Governing Council of the Institution on June 30, 2010. The Centre has organized in recent past an international lecture delivered by the President, Galilee International Management Institute, Nahalal, Israel and international workshops trainings in collaboration with CTA, Netherlands and ITOCA, South Africa.

In addition, a good number of staff/students have benefited from long and short term international trainings, conferences and workshops facilitated by CENIP in Israel, India, South Africa, Dubai and United Kingdom among others.

#### Mandates

Achievement of functional relationship within the University and with other agencies and institutions both nationally and internationally, in the realization of the mandate of FUNAAB through optimum utilization of shared resources.

### Linkage Policy

Any intended or on-going linkage activity involving the University with other local or foreign University shall be registered with CENIP clearly stating the linkage objectives, expected outputs, resource flows, linkage mechanisms and duration of the linkage. Any externally funded collaboration shall be duly registered with one electronic and one hard copy of the terms of the collaboration deposited with CENIP.

- A service charge of 12% of any international grant shall be deducted by the University as overhead cost.
- Of the 12% service charge to be deducted by the University on every internationally funded collaboration, 2% shall be for CENIP, while the balance of 10% shall be retained by the University.
- Any intended visit to any foreign University by any staff or students of FUNAAB shall be registered with CENIP clearly stating the visit objectives, expected outputs, resource flows, visit mechanisms and duration of the visit.
- All official visits by foreigners to FUNAAB shall be registered with CENIP through their hosts departments, clearly stating the visit objectives, expected outputs, resource flows and duration of the visit.
- Any linkage activity involving the University shall be supported by a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), which shall clearly spell out modalities for joint utilization of facilities and clearly specify who provides what.
- All MOUs shall necessarily be in tandem with the University's strategic linkage objectives and national developmental goals.
- Strong internal and external collaborative linkages.
- Result oriented collaboration with institutions and industries for optimum realization of training, research and extension mandate of FUNAAB.

# FUNAAB Foreign African Scholarship Scheme (FUFASS)

In a way to build networks with other nations, instrutions and universities across the globe and as part of efforts to strategically position the University among top 10 universities in Africa and among the top 100 Universities worldwide, the Governing Council of the Federal University of

Agriculture, Abeokuta at its meeting of June 11, 2010 established the FUNAAB Foreign African Scholarship Scheme (FUFASS) as a conscious effort to disseminate knowledge, through its contribution to sustainable development and poverty reduction, and support research efforts to be integrated into the international scientific community. The Scheme communical with effect from the 2010/2011 Academic Session with the pioneer set of beneficiaries from the Republic of Liberia, the Gambia and Sierra Leone.

FUNAAB remains till date one of the very few institutions in Africa to promote and fund this internationalization concept of providing scholarship opportunities for nominees of the Governments of African countries for Undergraduate, Postgraduate, Postdoctoral and Skills Acquisition Programmes. FUFASS aims at keeping beneficiaries up to date by providing innovative teaching tools that encourage acquisition of skills and knowledge for development.

FUFASS beneficiaries following the completion of their courses are to return home to apply the newly acquired skills and knowledge toward the development of their home countries in order to foster capacity building. CENIP maintains a popular link on the University web page, which is visited by million unique visitors.

# International Scholars ResourceCentre

The administrative office of CENIP is housed at the International Scholars Resource Centre which is a massive edifice conspicuously positioned on a high elevation where visitors would be entertained with a panoramic view of the superbly scenic campus. The Centre has modern facilities to host high level professional conferences and meetings, which include seminar theatres and rooms for plenary sessions and small group break-out sessions, as well as a twenty-four (24) room guest house which is equivalent of a five star hotel. The landscape is a beautiful one to behold in addition to a robust parking space and other relaxation outfits, all within a fenced enclosure to guarantee privacy and comfort. ### 8.0 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

#### 8.1 VICE-CHANCELLOR'S OFFICE

The Chief Executive and the Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokutal who is in charge of its day to day running of the University is Professor Olusola Bandele Oyewole. He is also the Accounting Officer statutorily appointed for a single term of five years by the Governing Council to provide sound academic and administrative leadership and direction. The Vice-Chancellor is assisted by two Deputies Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic), Prof. T. A. Arowolo and Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Development), Prof. F. K. Salako, Three other Principal Officers assist the Vice-Chancellor in running some segments of the University. They are the Registrar, Mr. M. O. Ayoola, the Bursar, Mr. M. O. Ilesanmi and the University Librarian, Dr. (Mrs) M. O. Salaam, Other Units working in concert under the directives of the Vice-Chancellor include:

#### Research and Academic Development

The academic profile of the University has soared tremendously in the last few years. A major reengineering was witnessed as curricula were reviewed, leading to the carving out of a new College of Food Science and Human Ecology (COLFHEC) and College of Agricultural Management and Rural Development (COLAMRUD) from the erstwhile College of Agricultural Management, Rural Development and Consumers Studies (COLAMRUCS). Two new Departments, of Agricultural Administration and Food Science and Tourism, were consequently established.

Having improved drastically on academic facilities, whereby stipulated criteria were not only achieved, but surpassed in the provision of basic requirement, full accreditation had been offered all University programmes. Moreover, with the directives of the Federal Government to specialize Universities and Monotechnics to diversify their academic programmes, the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta has established the College of Management Sciences with the Departments of Accounting, Banking and Finance, Business Management, Economics and Entrepreneurial Studies.

#### Graduate Farming Employment Scheme

In 2008, the University established a Graduate Farming Employment Scheme (GRADFES),

which is a Farm Settlement Programme to assist unemployed graduates of the University in owning their individual farms through the provision of a collateral-free loan and farmland on the Campus. The scheme took-off with 10 participants granted a sum of N250,000.00 each, interest-free with free farmland, prepared by the University for the production of maize, cowpeas, soyabeans and other varieties of crops. The loan is rolled-over within five years, with a year moratorium, before the principal is paid back into the scheme's Revolving Account.

The University provides a ready market for harvests from GRADFES. Apart from this, the University also assists in mechanizing the scheme by procuring tractor, plough, harrow, harvester and grain-sheller. A dedicated borehole was sunk to provide water and silos for harvest preservation. Participants enjoy the opportunity of using their proceeds to negotiate for bigger credit facility with commercial banks in order to maximize the economic potentials of the scheme. Amonitoring committee supervises and reports on the scheme, periodically

#### Administrative Reforms

The Vice-Chancellor, in his proactive manner created Additional Directorates as a paraces to noticeable stagnation in the workforce and also to prevent brain-drain as well as improving on service delivery. He created a novel Directorate system in the Registry and Bursary Departments of the University, with the appointments of hitherto stagnating Deputy Registrars/Bursars on the same Grade Level with the Registrar and Bursar.

- Registry: He created four Directorates viz Council Affairs, Academic Affairs, Establishment Affairs and Executive Affairs (Vice-Chancellor's Office);
- Bursary: He created three Directorates viz Treasury, Budget and Expenditure Control and Final Accounts and College Finance;
- (iii) Created a full-fledged Directorate of Public Relations which has largely enhanced the process of information management and public image of the University;
- (iv) Creation of the Directorate University Farm (DUFARM) to promote agricultural education and service for agricultural development;
- Establishment of Industrial Park Unit (IPU), a Centre in charge of commercial production, processing and marketing of agricultural produce such as palm oil, cashew nuts, honey, palm wine, garri, deodorized fufu flour, etc.


#### Increase in Financial Fortune

The Vice-Chancellor has brought fortune to the University through his wealth of experience in prudent financial management. Such shrewd ability and pro-activeness in judiciously utilizing scarce resources has earned him deep respect and confidence to entrust fund in his care. This has indeed translated into tremendously development in infrastructure.

#### Extra Government Earnings, EGE

The improved profile of the extra government earnings by the Vice-Chancellor has enabled the University to meet varying academic and social demands. Utilization of funds generated under this scheme is demonstrated on the various projects.





The National Universities Commission (NUC) on realization of the fact that

institutions are responsible for the quality of education they offer proposed and established the Academic Planning Unit (APU) in Nigerian universities in

the early 1980s.

Establishment of the Unit was in response to the need to coordinate and streamline the academic policies and activities arising from sudden and sometimes uncoordinated growth,

development and proliferation of programmes and units in the University System. APU is also to handle the collection and management of data and information to guide the academic development of university while ensuring the compliance of the institution and the units under it with NUC's Academic Standards and with the university Senate's academic requirements.

# ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE UNIT

#### Publication of Statistical Digests

The Unit publishes Statistical Digests annually to provide relevant statistical information on various sections within the University such as the different academic programmes being run at undergraduate and the postgraduate levels and their accreditation status, disposition and distribution of students and staff in the existing departments. The Unit has successfully and consistently produced the digest with the sixth edition unique in all respects.

#### Institutional Accreditation

The National Universities Commission (NUC) in its drive towards Quality Assurance undertook Institutional Accreditation and Ranking of Nigerian Universities. Consequently, the University was visited between December 5 and 8, 2011 by the NUC for Institutional Accreditation. The Academic Planning Unit produced the Self-Study Document that was used

for the exercise and coordinated the accreditation exercise. The University got 76.5%, a Grade Λ, which carned the University a full institutional accreditation status that will last for seven (7) years.

#### Resource Verification of COLMAS

The National Universities Commission carried out the Resource Verification Exercise of Programmes in the newly established College of Management Sciences on 20th October, 2011. The Academic Planning Unit coordinated and facilitated the activities of the Team with the result that the visited Programmes got approval to commence academic activities and instead of four Programmes, five were approved by NUC. The Programmes approved were Accounting, Business Administration, Banking and Finance, Economics and Entrepreneurial Studies.

#### Coordination of COREN Accreditation Visit

The Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN) carried out Accreditation Exercise of the Engineering Programmes of the University between 29th July and 2nd August, 2012. The Academic Planning Unit coordinated and facilitated the activities of the Team with the result that the visited Programmes viz. Agricultural Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Electronic Engineering and Mechanical Engineering got Full Accreditation from COREN.

#### Academic Brief

The Academic Brief is conceived as a tool for planning, decision-making and policy formulation at all stages of the development of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta. It defines the philosophy and objectives of the University and sets out the administrative structure, the academic and out-reach programmes and the developmental strategies for achieving these objectives. The Academic Planning Unit alerted University Management on the need to review the University's Academic Brief which was due for review in 2010. Consequently, Management set up a Committee made up of senior academics to review the document. The Committee has completed its assignment and is at the point of submitting its report to Management.

#### Mock Resource Verification

The Unit carried out mock resources verification exercise for two new programmes namely. Agricultural Administration in the College of Agricultural Management and Rural Development, and Foodservice and Tourism in the College of Food Science and Human Ecology between 22<sup>rd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> September, 2010 in preparation for the NUC visitation for the resources assessment of the programme. The resource verification exercise of the programmes was done between 26<sup>rd</sup> and 27<sup>rd</sup> May, 2011 and they were subsequently approved by NUC to run.

#### Mock Accreditation

The Unit conducted muck accreditation exercises for eighteen (18) programmes which were due for the NUC Accreditation between 2010 and 2012. These included programmes due for visit in 2010: Biochemistry, Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Microbiology, Physics, Statistics, Civil Engineering, Electrical/Electronic Engineering, Aquaculture and Fisherics Management and Food Science and Technology, Also, 3 programmes, Agriculture, Forestry & Wild-Life Management and Home Science & Management and 2 programmes due for accreditation in 2011 and Nutrition & Dietetics and Water Resources Management and Agricultural Meteorology were made to undergo mock accreditation to also prepare them for NUC Accreditation.

#### Data Bank

Major activities of the Unit centre on careful collection, handling, unalysis and interpretation of data from various sections and on changing trends within the University. The data so generated are periodically updated to assist the management in annual planning. Within the past year, the Unit has been able to update the University's Full-Time Equivalent (FTE), the graduate output, students' enrolment, and update of both academic and non-academic staff disposition. The actual and expected ratio of teacher to students and the University carrying capacity were also calculated. Table 18 presents type of data being generated and their usefulness to the University Management.

#### 83 DIRECTORATE OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

The Directorate of Public Relations became a full-fledged Directorate in 2008. It is basically responsible for information management and dissemination as well as the establishment and sustenance of mutual interactions between the University and its publics.

The Directorate is structured into three Units, namely: Media and External Relations; Protocol and Passages; and Technical.

#### ACTIVITIES/PROJECTS CARRIED OUT

- Production of Weekly FUNAAB Bulletin: This involves the production and circulation of the FUNAAB's Weekly Bulletin; which chronicles the major activities of the University.
- Community Relations: Maintenance of mutual community relationship with relevant public media, parents, host community, opinion leaders, etc.
- Photography/Video Coverage: Coverage of University-wide programmme, through the use of modern equipment in the production of photography and video materials.
- Production of FUNAAB News Magazine: Production of the yearly University magazine.
- Production of Handbills, Banners, Posters and Notice boards: To disseminate University information to target audience.
- Processing of entry visas and flight tickets for University officials/students: Providing
  effective visa assistance and processing of flight tickets for University officials and
  students, as well as airport reception for important guests.
- Administration of Gesture: The Directorate facilitates and coordinates the distribution of gesture items to internal and external publics of the University.
- FUNAAB Souvenir Shop: Floating of a University Souvenir Shop to sell items as mementoes, newspapers, magazines and topical publications. This is part of the incomegenerating drive of the Directorate.
- FUNAAB FM Radio: To commence the broadcast of community radio, to help the University achieve its tripartite mandates, of teaching, research and outreach services.
- Acting as interface between the University and the mass media.

- Production of high quality Bulletin of about 500 copies weekly circulated to Council Members, Principal Officers, Deans, Directors, HODs/HOUs and friends of the University. Also, the Bulletin is pasted on notice boards around the campus.
- The Directorate serves as veritable medium of reporting major events and activities of the University.
- It has also been able to maintain and sustain cordial atmosphere between the University and its publics.
- Pictorial cataloguing of major University events for postcrity.
- Reaching-out, through the production of handbills and posters to members of the University and its environs.
- Hoisting of news, events and other information items on the FUNAAB's website: www.unaab.edu.ng.
- Placement of advertisements and advertorials in national newspapers and the Federal Tenders' Journals for contracts, bids, vacancies, etc.
- The Directorate has also played a major role in the processing/fastracking of entry visas for various University officials and students, as well as airport reception for important guests.
- Coordination at various University events, by providing anchoring services and Protocol arrangements for major guests.

#### Protection of Students from Sexual or any Form of Harassment



#### Bursary and Scholarship

Processing of Bursary and Scholarship for students is an integral part of activities carried out in the Student Áffairs. Unit. All issues relating to Bursary and Scholarship are given utmost attention including generation of list of potential students for the awards.



The Directorate is suddled with the responsibility of developing and enhancing the natural and physical landscape of the university campus to achieve cleaner, healthier and aesthetic environment conducive for learning, research and social wellbeing of all within the university community:

The Directorate has two major units that implement the above vision and mission statement.

- Parks and Garden Unit (Landscaping, Parks Establishment and Beautification, Plant Nursery)
- Sanitation Unit (Waste Management, Building Cleaning, Drainage and Roads Clearing, Fumigation and Pest Control)

The implementation arrangement of the Directorate is through zoning of the University campus into 13 operational zones with average crew size of 8 - 10 casual workforce, who operate the machines or use hand tools to manage the turf. In the last 3 years, the Directorate through its Parks and Garden Unit

has carried out the landscaping of the following facilities within the University, Postgraduate School, COLFHEC, Biotech Lab, INHURD, International Scholars and Resource Centre, Executive Lodges, Unity Buildings, Bus Station, Central Car Park, 2000 Auditorium, 500 Computer Centre, Farm Centre, 2500 Auditorium environs, Sports Centre and the expansion and standardization of the Plant Nursery. In 2012 alone, a total of 2150 assorted tree seedlings as well as bedges along the various walk/drive ways have been planted to greatly increase the campus tree camppy and enhance the plant bio-diversity.


The Sanitation Unit of the Directorate adopts both the direct and in-direct approach towards managing the waste, clean the buildings as well as manage pests and rodents through famigation and adoption of other control measures. Private Service Providers (PSPs) or External Contractors manage the daily cleaning of all buildings in the different zones as well as waste evacuation and disposal. There are sweepers and pickers who are also casual workers and who work to keep the campus landscape clean and neat.

The Directorate fosters collaboration and cooperation with the Department of Horticulture of the University for Practical Exposure for mutual benefit. The platform for the acquisition of practical experience for both undergraduate and postgraduate students of horticulture has been created. Within this reporting period, five postgraduate students have benefited from practical experience in plant nursery operations and landscape establishment. Four postgraduate students of Horticulture were engaged as supervisors for landscape development projects in 2011/2012. Another six postgraduate students received lectures and hands-on experience on Machinery and Equipment for Organicital Horticulture and Rehabilitation of Landscapes in 2012. Two part-time students are also currently engaged as casual Supervisor in the Sanitation Unit.

The challenges faced by the Directorate in implementation of its projects include:

- Non-involvement of the Directorate by the Physical Planning Unit (PPU) of the University in the conceptualization, designs and implementation of buildings and landscape projects for the University.
- Lack of Operational guidelines and enforcement for all categories of contractors executing various projects on the University landscape, which infringe on the work of others especially the Directorate's main operations leading to trampling of established lawns, abandonment of unused construction materials on sites and piling of debris by different contractors engaged for projects supervised by the PPU.
- Water supply and distribution especially during the dry season pose serious challenges to the maintenance of ornamental plants and lawns.
- Lack of proper perception of the greening initiative by some member of the University Community and appreciation of the huge cost involved in


#### sustaining it.

The several initiatives of the Directorate of Environmental Management towards creating an enabling Campus environment have earned the University (FUNAAB) commendations in several quarters. FUNAAB'S campus environment has suddenly become toost of every lover of greenery and beautification. The aesthetics and value addition of the landscaping (well-kept lawns, trees, shrubs and hedges), cannot be quantified.

The environment of FUNAAB earned it full marks at the last institutional accreditation conducted by NUC.

The essential sustainability elements for the Directorate's Greening and Beautification Initiatives are:

Adequate Manpower (Skilled, Semi-skilled & Unskilled) these are the Professional Officer cadre, Technical and the Labour force.

- Adequate machinery and equipment for the operations in the classified 13 Campus zones.
- Sustainable funding arrangement to cater for operational expenses; (labour wages, fuel & lubricants, spare parts procurement, repairs and maintenance of equipment as well replacement where necessary).

FUNAAB is a model campus that enhances learning, research, social wellbeing and livelihood, the Directorate should be properly positioned to fulfil its mandate.

#### 8.6 ALUMNIUNIT

The contributions and supports of the Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta in the 2011/2012 were better than the previous years and cannot be under-rated.

The Alumni Association did some philanthropic supports to the needy students and alleviated the suffering of indigent students in FUNAAB. The right support to fellow member of the Alumni and some FUNAAB students were also put in place.

The hallmark of the achievement of the Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abcokuta was the recent completion of her Ultra-modern building (Alumni Centre), the rare of its kind on Nigerian Universities Campuses. Usually universities provide office accommodation for the Alumni Unit, but the Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abcokuta had gone an extra mile by building a Centre to complement the efforts of the University Management in making FUNAAB a world class.

The Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta extended its philanthropic arms to the indigent students by paying the school fees of a good number of indigent students.

The Alumni Association observed with passion the suffering of some students especially shortly before the commencement of each semester examination and made food intervention (support) for some needy students. More so, some students that couldn't afford stationeries for their academic work were not left un-catered for, they were equally supported with fund. The Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta also supported the FUNAAB sports contingent to the 2012 Nigerian Universities Games (NUGA) with the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Naira only (N500, 000:00) and the award of the sum of Five hundred thousand Naira only (N500, 000:00) was also given to the best graduating physically challenged students (Male and Female) at the last convocation ceremony.

The Alumni Association of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abcokuta did not stop at the FUNAAB undergraduate and postgraduate levels but went extra mile to arrange career talks for the students of the FUNAAB International School to assist them in making a wise choices in their future academic pursuit.

It is also important to bring to limelight that the Alumni Association of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta supported some of her members in need or those facing some challenges.

The Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta is usually well represented and a voice to reckone with at the Committee of the Alumni (Conference of Alumni Associations of Nigerian Universities). The Alumni of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta is great and has potential to be greater in the nearest future.

## 9.0 BUDGETARY AND FINANCIAL MATTERS

The issues relating to Budget and Finance of the University are the responsibility of the Bursary Department. In the year under review, the Bursary Department performed creditably well in their handling of financial matters of the University. The Head of the Bursary Department is the Bursar, who is the Chief Financial Officer of the University and is responsible to the Vice Chancellor for the day to day administration and control of the financial affixirs of the University.

The Bursary Department is made up of the Bursar's Office, the Directorate of Treasury, the Directorate of Expenditure Control, the Directorate of Investment and Insurance, the Directorate of Final Accounts and the Directorate of Statistics. The Department has been structured to address the various functions associated with the components of financial management as follows:


