VALEDICTORY SPEECH DELIVERED BY ODUNSI ODUNAYO ESTHER ON BEHALF OF THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 2018 AT THE 27TH CONVOCATION CEREMONY OF THE FEDERAL UNIVERSITY OF AGRICULTURE, ABEOKUTA

The Chancellor, Pro-Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Deputy Vice-Chancellors, other Principal Officers of the University, Deans of Colleges, Head of Departments, Heads of Units, amiable lecturers, members of staff, distinguished guests, families, friends and of course the graduating class of 2018.

If you, however, focus on what you need to do and believe that what you are doing will yield, your challenges will not hinder you. In spite of my challenges, I was flourishing in my academic work, and volunteering and taking an active role in community service. My low-

income was not a barrier but a launching pad to motivate and propel my success. I developed the tenacity, perseverance and persistence needed to pull through challenging situations to achieve my dreams and these prepared me to face whatever the world out there has to throw at me.

However, I do not stand here as a lone star in the night sky. I stand here as a representation of the tenacious, creative, and excellent spirit every graduate here carries. I stand here as a reminder that you can take your life in your grasp and scale through the hurdles ahead of you. I stand here to incite in you that the world is your canvas and you decide what you paint on it. I stand here to show you that one with God and the right priorities is truly majority. I stand here to validate the concept of grace and God's favour.

Yet, I stand here to challenge you to stop limiting yourself by your economic situations. I challenge you to look inwards and bring forth all the wonderful light and colours you can add to the world. I challenge you to even look beyond whatever grade you are graduating with and know that YOU CAN ALWAYS BE BETTER! Not all of us will be in academics, not all of us will have master's degrees or PhDs, not all of us will be listed in Forbes list or Times magazine. Yet, ALL OF US CAN SHINE BRIGHTLY AND BRING JOY TO THIS WORLD IN ALL WE DO. We can all also raise the banner of our names, families and of course this great citadel FUNAAB. So, I challenge you, GO SHINE AND SHINE!

As I end my chatter, I say to every parent here, keep supporting us. Stand by us even when we don't get it right. Don't impress your dreams on us. Rather, help us spread our wings with your prayers and counsel. Keep being the shoulder on which we climb to see the world. To every lecturer and instructor here seated, on behalf of other grandaunts, I say thank you. We will always be a reflection of your investments, so I challenge you also, beyond the status quo, give your best to everyone. You never know what that little boy or girl in your class will turn out to be, so give us your best.

FUNAAB has been for me way more than a place of academic learning as I have grown here. I will like, at this juncture acknowledge the role played by the FUNAAB's Chapter of the Nigeria Association of University Women under the leadership of Prof. Comfort Onifade. The Association empowered me by sponsoring my entrepreneurial training as a Fashion Designer under the University's CENT programme; the skill helped in alleviating my 'financial stress' tremendously and has become very useful to me today.

Other University resources which contributed to this success story are: the affordable tuition fee and conducive learning environment (mancot, hostel and library facitilies). The hostel facilities provided me more conducive academic atmosphere and social integration. MANCOT made the transportation system highly subsidized and relatively free. The 'Nimbe Adedipe Library's exceptional, reliable, condusive and convenient facilities of a 24-hour/7 examination period services is highly commendable!

I appreciate the efforts of the Vice–Chancellors who served during my studentship, specifically, the current Vice-Chancellor; Professor Felix Kolawole Salako for being in loco parentis and concerned with the welfare and comfortability of students on campus. Saving the best for last, finally, I thank the Lord Jesus Christ, my good Father for his day-by-day guidance and preservation. You are the one who let me finish my degree and I will keep on trusting you for my future. Thank you Lord.

Always remember dear colleagues that, the road may be rough, the journey may be tough and the experience may be bitter, but they are stepping stones to our future thrones. Thus, to our juniors, I say "May the winds favour your sail!"
