FROM THE VICE-CHANCELLOR'S DESK

I am pleased to introduce the 2019 Annual Report, which illustrates the University's commitment to advancing excellence in education, research and scholarship. I am committed to building a University that creates new knowledge, disseminates knowledge and applies same for the benefit of mankind as well as create a conducive and serene environment for teaching and learning leading to turn-out of graduates who can measure up favourably with their counterparts from other universities, globally.

In the last fourteen (14) months, the University has made history in the areas of Research and Scholarship, among these were the award of the Certificate of Registration of the first Improved local Chicken Breed branded FUNAAB ALPHA by the National Centre for Genetic Resources and Biotechnology (NACGRAB), strengthening of relationship with World Bank-African Centre of Excellence, Restructuring of Centre for Excellence in Agricultural Development and Sustainable Environment (CEADESE), and Cassava Adding Value for Africa (CAVA), signing of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the University and Institutions within and outside the country such as FUNAAB-AWARD (African Women in Agricultural Research and Development), and FUNAAB-UNIMAID (University of Maiduguri).

The University had a smooth Accreditation Exercise for eight programmes with full accreditation in line with the Bench Mark for Academic Standard (BMAS) of the National Universities Commission (NUC). The University has witnessed further growth and development in the areas of physical infrastructure, human capital and financial resources. Major projects were commissioned, including, the ultra-modern undergraduate twin-hostels (Male and Female Blocks) which would increase the number of students living on campus. Also, the CENTS Building, 750 Seater Science Laboratory Complex, Cassava Processing Facility and the 250-Seater Computer Facility as well as the renovation of Laboratories and Lecture Theatres while some others are on-going, one of which is the rehabilitation of the University's access road from Camp to campus gate. Some are at the commencement stages. These projects were made possible by TETFund allocation, capital grants from the Federal Government of Nigeria to the University in the year under review as well as National Resources Institute-European Union – Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for Agricultural Development (NRI-EU-BMGF-IFAD) and World Bank Conference des Responsables de Recherche Agronomique Africains (CORAF) Upscaling the Nigerian Flash Drying Experience for Sustainable Regional Trade in West Africa – (UDESWA)

On staff welfare, our administration has strengthened the congenial atmosphere on campus and we have also enhanced harmonious working relationship with all the unions on campus in the last one year. The leaders of the various unions have imbibed dialogue and constructive engagement with the management which is a sign

of commitment to placing the interest of the University above all other interests. The resultant effect is the high productivity of staff generally, hence the large number of beneficiaries of the 2018 promotion exercise. An ample number of teaching and non-teaching staff have also benefited from local and overseas training programmes through TETFund intervention and other sources.

The University as a matter of policy has always held the welfare of the students in high esteem and without sounding immodest, the University has always been fortunate to have student leaders who are inclined toward responsible unionism and dialogue by aligning themselves with the mission and vision of the University. The physically-challenged students have not been left out, as their needs have always received priority to rekindle their hope and optimism.

As I always reiterate, there is no higher calling than serving God and humanity while we still live and I belong to the school of thought that believes that in serving humanity, we serve God. I would like to use this golden opportunity to once again appreciate the members of staff and students of this University for their unflinching support and commitment to the mission and vision of this administration. I enjoin all stakeholders to join me in making our University a great citadel of learning for the advancement of knowledge for development.

The following activities, among numerous others, were carried out during the year under review:

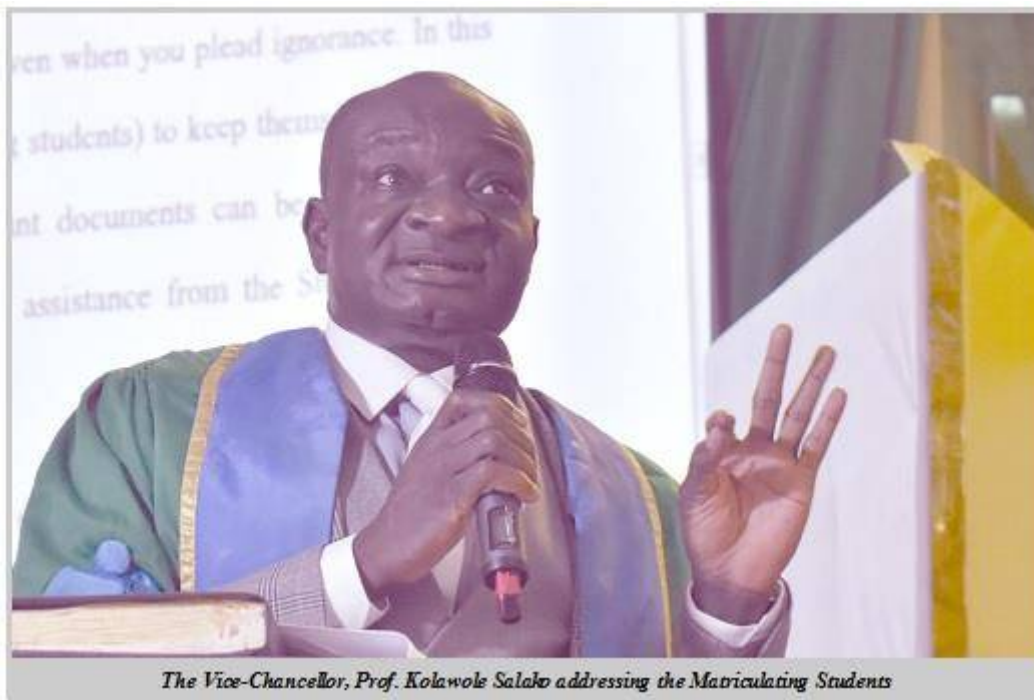

FUNAAB Matriculates 4,013 Students

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta has matriculated a total of 4,013 students for the 2018/2019 Academic Session. Delivering his Address at the Matriculation ceremony, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Kolawole Salako informed that the matriculation of 2018/2019 was the second he would be presiding over as the Vice-Chancellor of the University.

Professor Salako reminded the students that Matriculation ceremony is an event that affirms that students have been admitted into the university. According to him, "Matriculation Ceremony is not just a ceremony: It is an Oath-Taking exercise to affirm that you have been admitted. Anyone who does not sign the matriculation register is not our student", he reiterated.

Advising the students, the Vice-Chancellor encouraged them to feel free to consult those in relevant positions in case they have any issues bothering them. They can confide in their Departmental Heads, Deans or better still go to the Student Affairs Unit.

Remember your Primary Purpose of Being in the University – Prof. Osinowo Charges Matriculants



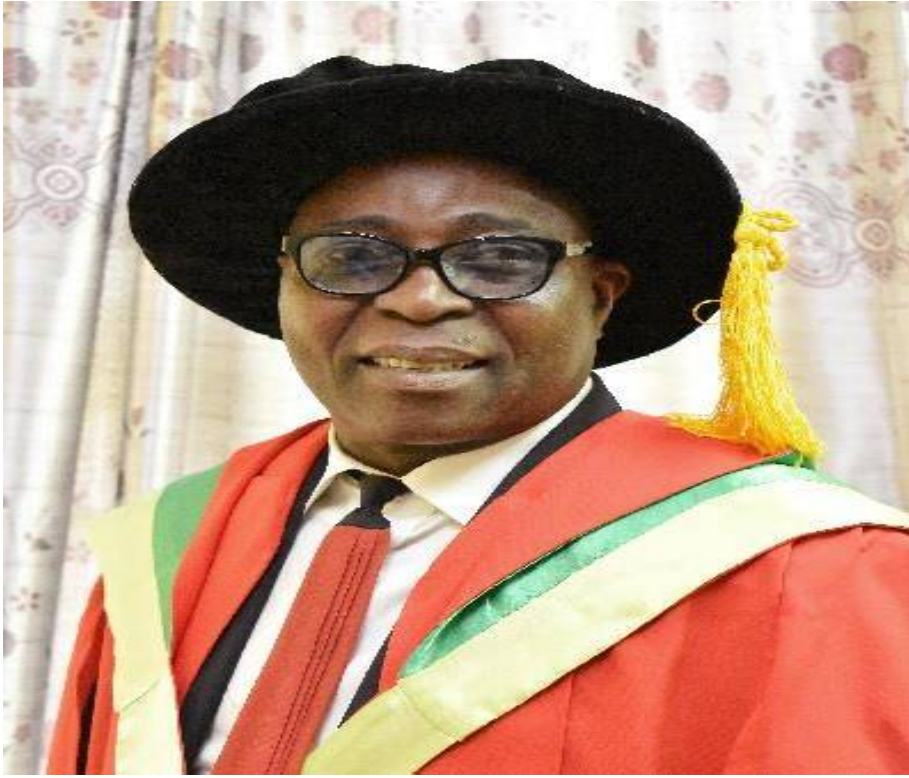

This advice was given by a retired University Don and a one time Director of the Institute of Food Security, Environmental Resources and Agricultural Research (IFSERAR), Professor Olusegun Osinowo, while delivering this year's Commencement Lecture titled, "Sailing to Success", to the Matriculating students.

According to Professor Osinowo, aside other arrays of attractions that abound in the University environment, students should bear in mind, that their main aim in the University is "to acquire high level knowledge and skills that would equip them (the students) for a successful intellectual and professional life".

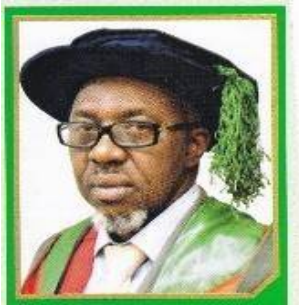

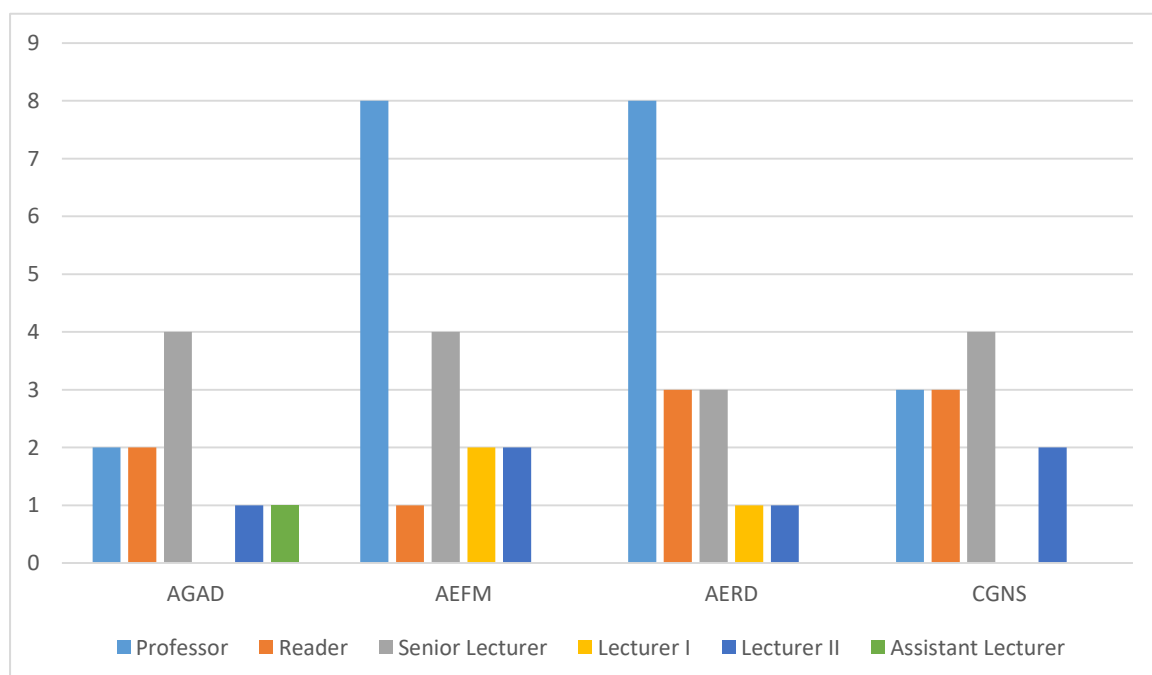

Overview of the College

The College Agricultural Management and Rural Development (COLAMRUD) started as College of Agricultural Management, Rural Development and Consumer Studies (COLAMRUCS) in 1988, was renamed COLAMRUD in 2009 when COLFHEC was carved out. The College is presently made up of four departments, namely: Department of Agricultural Administration (AGAD), Department of Agricultural Economics and Farm Management (AEFM), Department of Agricultural Extension and Rural Development (AERD) and Department of Communication and General Studies (CGNS).

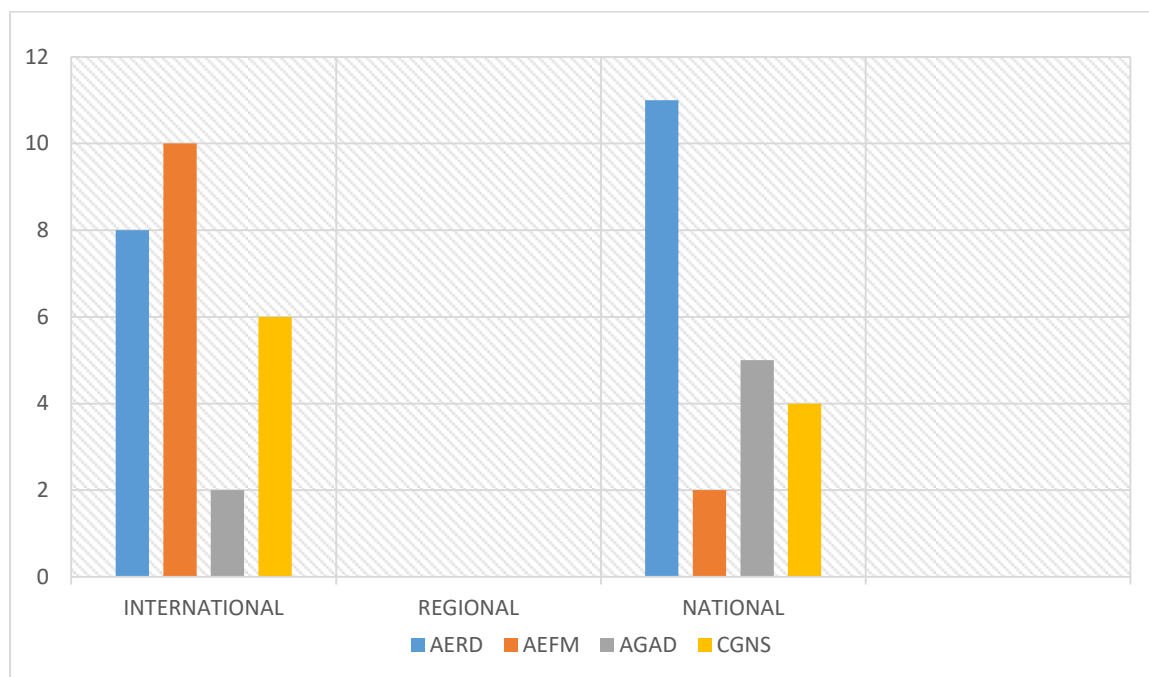

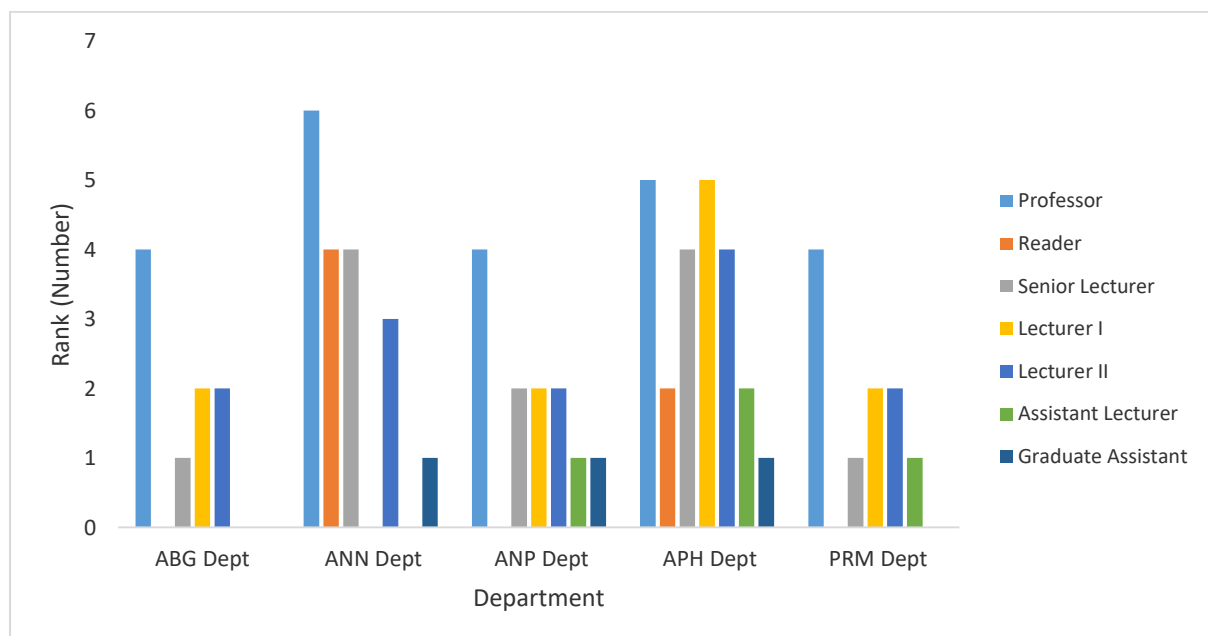


Figure 1: Academic Staff Profile in the 2017/2018 Academic Session

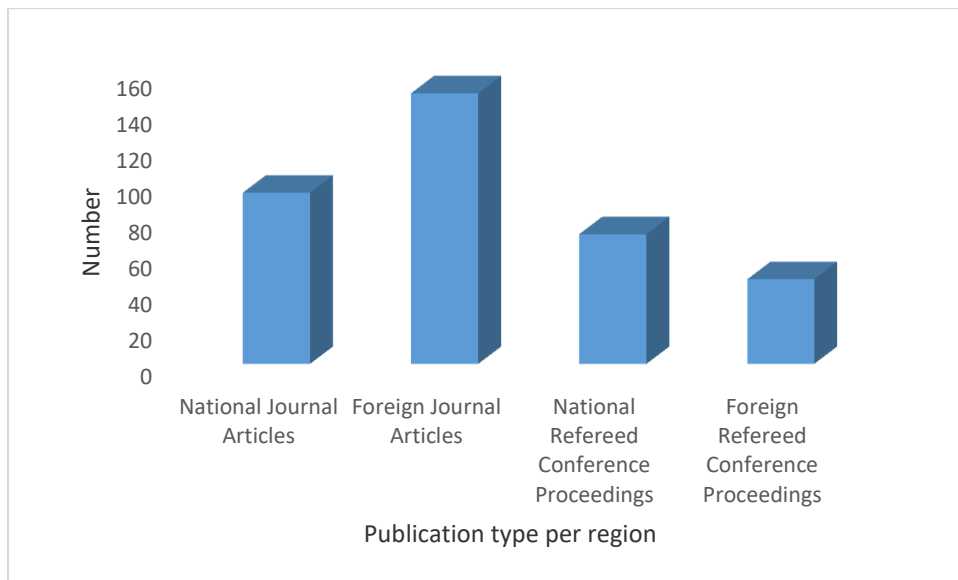


Figure 2: Research Output of Academic Staff in 2017/2018 academic session

Achievements and Projections for 2019

On July 26, 2018, National Centre for Genetic Resources and Biotechnology (NAGRAB), Ibadan, Nigeria registered of FUNAAB-ALPHA Chicken, a project sponsored by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation with a formal presentation of Certificate of Registration to Prof. Mrs. O. A. Adebambo, the Principal Investigator.

Thirteen new academic staff have been appointed by the University into the College of Animal Science and Livestock Production. In 2018, teaching and research activities in COLANIM were remarkable. Total of 2,458 undergraduates and 210 postgraduate students (with 81% of them pursuing Master's degree, 3% postgraduate Diploma and 16% pursuing doctorate degree programme, respectively) from the five Departments in the College were attended to.

Notable events executed successfully by the college in 2018 include: COLANIM was overall best team in the medals table in the 2018 Inter-Collegiate Sports/Vice-Chancellor's Cup competition.

Professors S. S. Abiola, A. B. J. Aina and O. A. Adebambo of the College retired from the services of the University.

In 2018, over ten (10) research proposals submitted by COLANIM academic staff were rated excellent and accepted for funding by TETFund through the Directorate of Grants Management of the University.

The College of Biosciences (COLBIOS), is one of the newest Colleges of the University. As the institution's metamorphoses continued, COLBIOS is one of the two Colleges carved out of the former and large COLNAS. The College was re-organized into four independent departments including BCH, MCB, PAZ and PAB effective November 2014. The story of FUNAAB will therefore not be completed without the College of Biosciences mentioned as part of the new FUNAAB.

Considering the fact that science is the bedrock of agricultural and technological development and that modern agriculture in all its ramifications can only be scientifically practiced. COLBIOS is central in the generation of basic knowledge from handling all aspects of agriculture and its mandate. In this regard, it is imperative that all other colleges must link to COLBIOS for applied research. Presently, it is mandatory that all students passing through FUNAAB must pass through the College of Biosciences, in their 100 and 200 levels especially BIO 101, BIO 102, BIO103 and BIO 206. 4. DEPARTMENT OF PURE AND APPLIED ZOOLOGY

1. BACKGROUND AND PROFILE

The Department of Pure and Applied Zoology came into existence in December 2014. Before then, the Department was a unit and option under the Department of Biological Sciences, a foundation Department of the university since 1988. At inception, the Department offered B.Sc. Biological Sciences with options in Microbiology and Applied Biology. After initial accreditation of courses in the Department, the curriculum was reviewed with more course options made available to students. Degrees were then awarded with options in Botany, Microbiology and Zoology. In 2001, the Department of Microbiology was created out of Biological Sciences. The Department of Biological Sciences offers B.Sc. Biological Sciences degree programme with options in Botany and Zoology. Usually, students are admitted into the Department as students of Biological Sciences until their second year (depending on mode of entry), when they commence studies in the various course options.

The then Department of Biological Sciences had seasoned academics as Heads of Department namely Dr O. Oke (1991-93), Dr Mukaila Kadiri (1993-1997), Dr. Chiedu Felix Mafiana (1997-2001), Dr. Adewunmi Babatunde Idowu (2001-2003), Dr M. S. Ayodele (2003-2005), Prof David Adejare Agboola (2005-2008), Prof Adewunmi

Babatunde Idowu (2008-2009), Prof Mukaila Kadiri (2009-2012), and Dr Uwem Ekpo (2012-14)

In 2014, the Department of Biological Sciences was split into the Department of Pure and Applied Botany and Department of Pure and Applied Zoology with Prof Uwem Friday Ekpo as the First Head of Department (2014-2017), followed by the appointment of Prof Sammy O. H. Sam-Wobo as the current Head of Department (2017-2020). Thus, presently, the Department of Pure and Applied Zoology offers B.Sc. Zoology degree programme.

Our Focus

The focus of Pure and Applied Zoology is the study and understanding of nature (animals), their physiology, anatomy, genetics, ecology, etc. This is quite relevant to agriculture and human survival. Majority of students admitted into the university, takes compulsory 100 level courses from this department which prepared them for their various studies, in Sciences, Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine. Thus, the Department is therefore directly related to the aim for setting up the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta.

At postgraduate level, the Department offers M Sc. and PhD in major sub-disciplines of Zoology. The postgraduate courses are offered in Parasitology, Animal Physiology, Entomology, Animal Ecology and Environmental Biology; and Animal Taxonomy and Biosystematics.

Collaborative Research Activities

The Department is involved in collaborative research with other departments within and outside the University. Beside teaching and research, the department provides ancillary services to the university and ministries of health at the national and state levels, departments and agencies (MDAs) in the country. These services include but not limited to the following areas: human and animal public health services, disease control, monitoring and evaluation, Insect and pest control, GIS mapping services and small animal breeding.

There exist an on-going discussion between the Chinese Government (NIPD officials) and Federal Ministry of Health on a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for China-Nigeria Schistosomiasis Project. The MoU will form the basis of cooperative assistance from China to Nigeria. It is noted that the Federal University of Agriculture, has been nominated as the joint implementing partner for China-Nigeria Schistosomiasis Control Project.

After the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) and Framework of cooperative assistance, some of the key projects involving FUNAAB are

- 1. Establishment of a demonstration site in Ogun State*
- 2. Identification, mapping of transmission sites for snail control*

- Support for the establishment and equipping of the State of Art Snail Vector Molecular Biology Laboratory at Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta as a West Africa reference Centre of China-Africa collaborating centre for Schistosomiasis Molecular Malacology.
- *Maintain repository and database of different species of snail intermediate hosts in Nigeria.*
- *Support for training in malacology, and mapping of snail habitats.*
- *Identification of transmission for snail vector control*
- *Training in the application of molluscicide*
- *Exchange programme and visit between China and Nigeria experts in malacology*
- *Develop snail distribution and transmission sites maps for Nigeria*
- *Assessment of the contribution of animal and non-human primate schistosome to the transmission of schistosomiasis in demonstration sites.*

3. Training and capacity building

- Training and strengthening of FMOH and FUNAAB through joint collaborative studies (M.Sc, PhD and Post Doc)
- Exchange visits between FMOH, FUNAAB and China CDC for short training and human resource development.

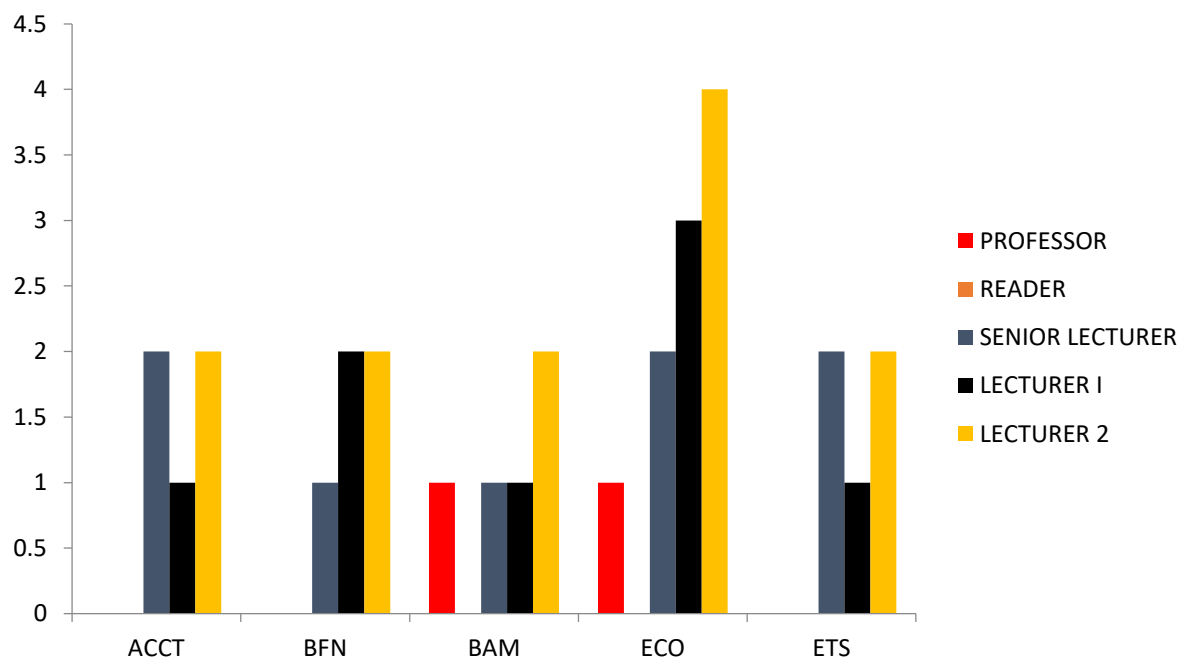

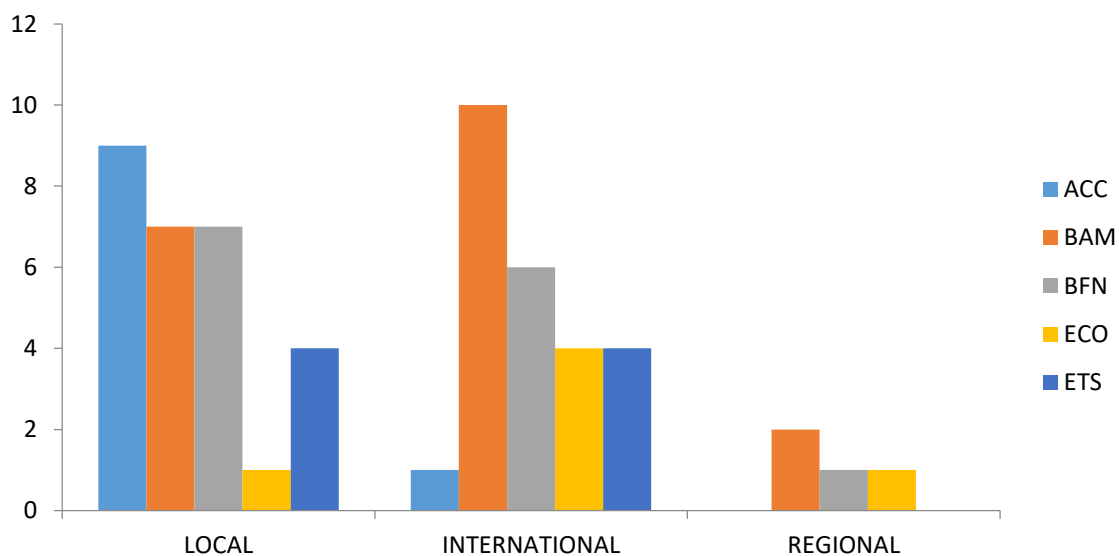

Akinwale from the Department of Computer Science is currently piloting the affairs of the College.

2.0 MAJOR ACTIVITIES/COLLABORATIONS

2.1 COLLEGE RETREAT

The Dean, Professor A. T. Akinwale organized a one day retreat for members of the academic staff of the College few weeks after his assumption of duty as Dean of the College. The Retreat titled 2019 COLPHYS Retreat was held on 19th May, 2019 at Postgraduate School Hall. Highlights of the event included presentation of papers by some senior Professors in the College.

2.2 COLPHYS NATIONAL CONFERENCE

The College under the leadership of Professor A. T. Akinwale also held its first International Conference on Developmental Sciences and Technologies with the theme “Advancing Scientific Frontlines for sustainable Development” from 27th to 30th August, 2019. - 3. The University should address the dependence of the College on supply of water by water tanker (which often are not regular) by the provision of bore hole to service the old COLNAS Building being shared by both COLPHYS and COLBIOS.*
- 4. Lastly, provision of comfort stations for students of the College will go a long way in addressing their plight when nature calls.*

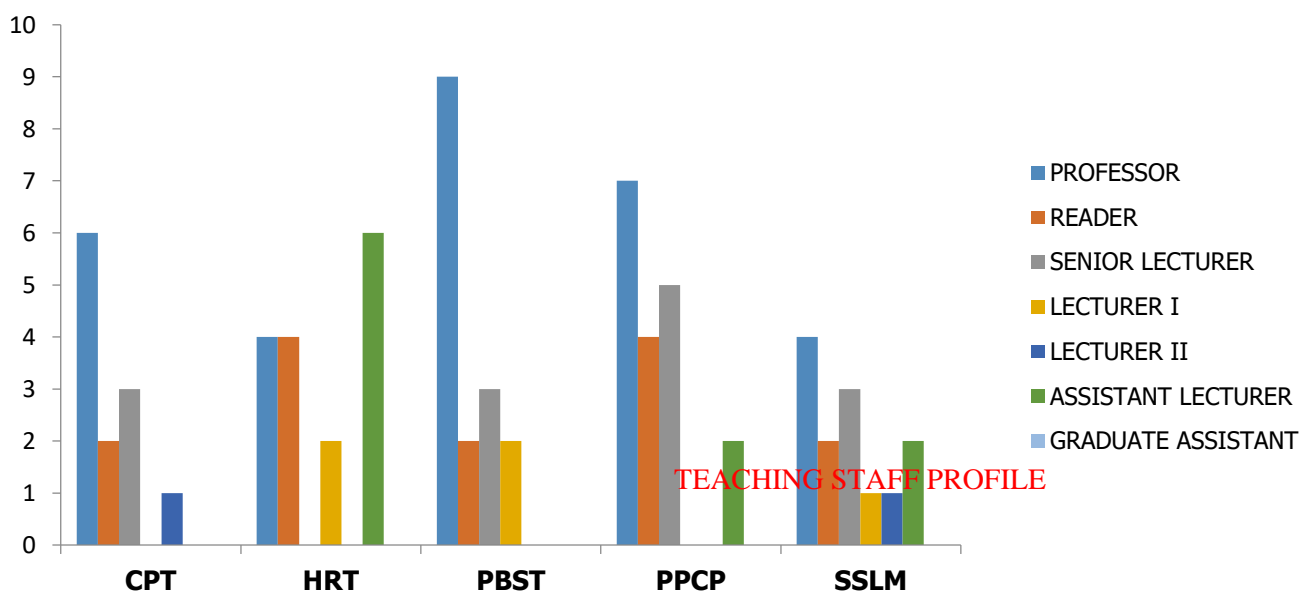

A: THE COLLEGE OF VETERINARY MEDICINE.

The College of Veterinary Medicine (COLVET) is one of the two Colleges slated for the second phase of development of the University. It took off with the admission of the first set of 100 level students into the six-year Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree programme in the 2001/2002 session.

GENERAL PHILOSOPHY AND OBJECTIVES

The general philosophy of the College is to produce skilled manpower that is adequately furnished with comprehensive information required for engaging in economic livestock production, animal health, public health, research and teaching, and to produce veterinarians who will be job creators rather than job seekers.

The objectives of the College are:

to provide adequate training that will enable recipients facilitate production of wholesome meat, dairy and poultry products and promote public health.

to equip trainees with knowledge and skill for teaching, research and public service functions.

The DVM degree curriculum consists of two parts: the pre-professional phase of two semesters (100 level) and the professional phase of ten semesters (200-600 level). The professional phase includes the pre-clinical phase, para-clinical phase and the clinical phase.

Department of Veterinary Public Health and Reproduction.

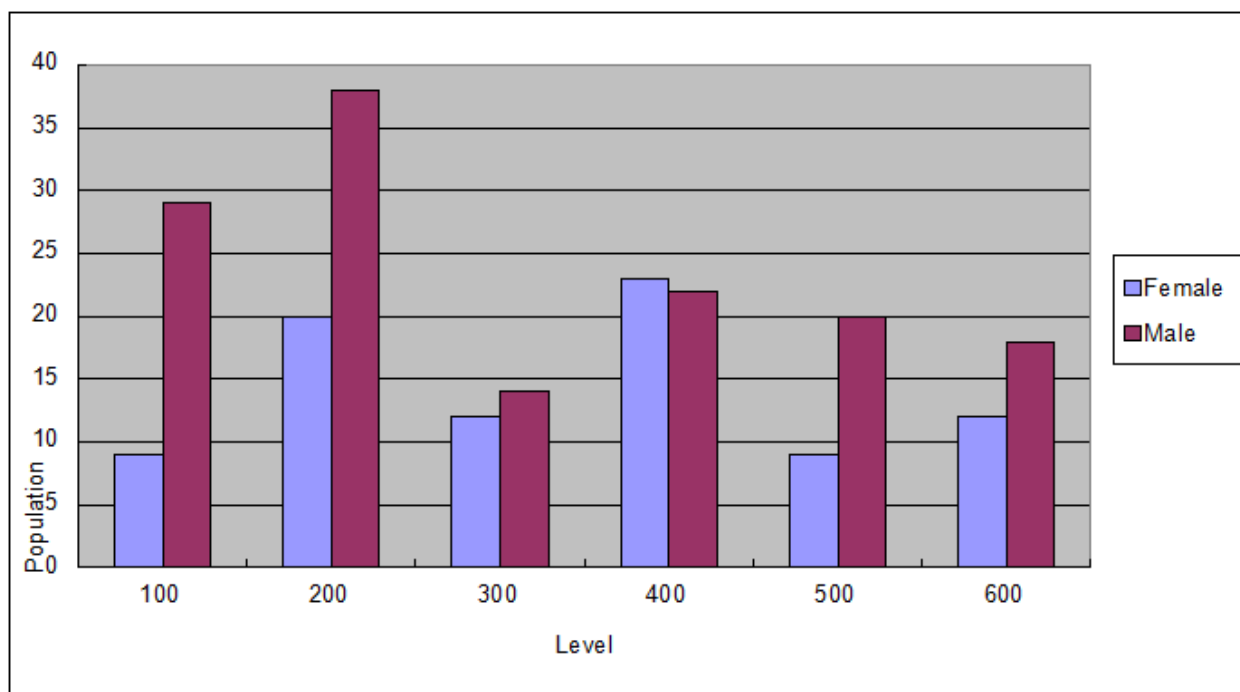

Student population for 2018/2019 academic session



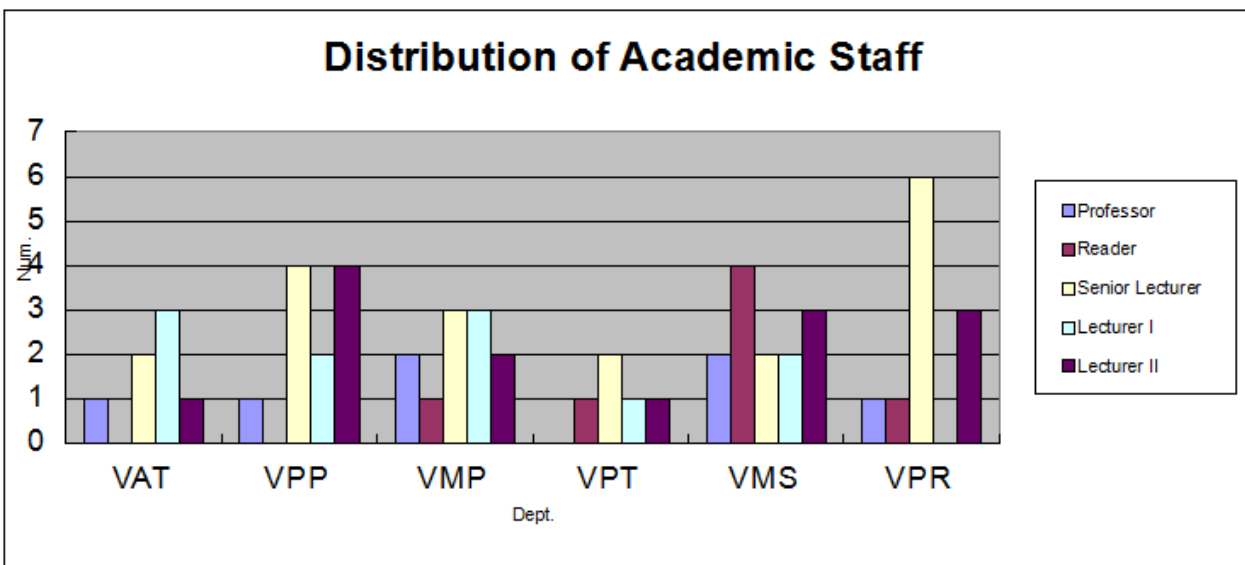

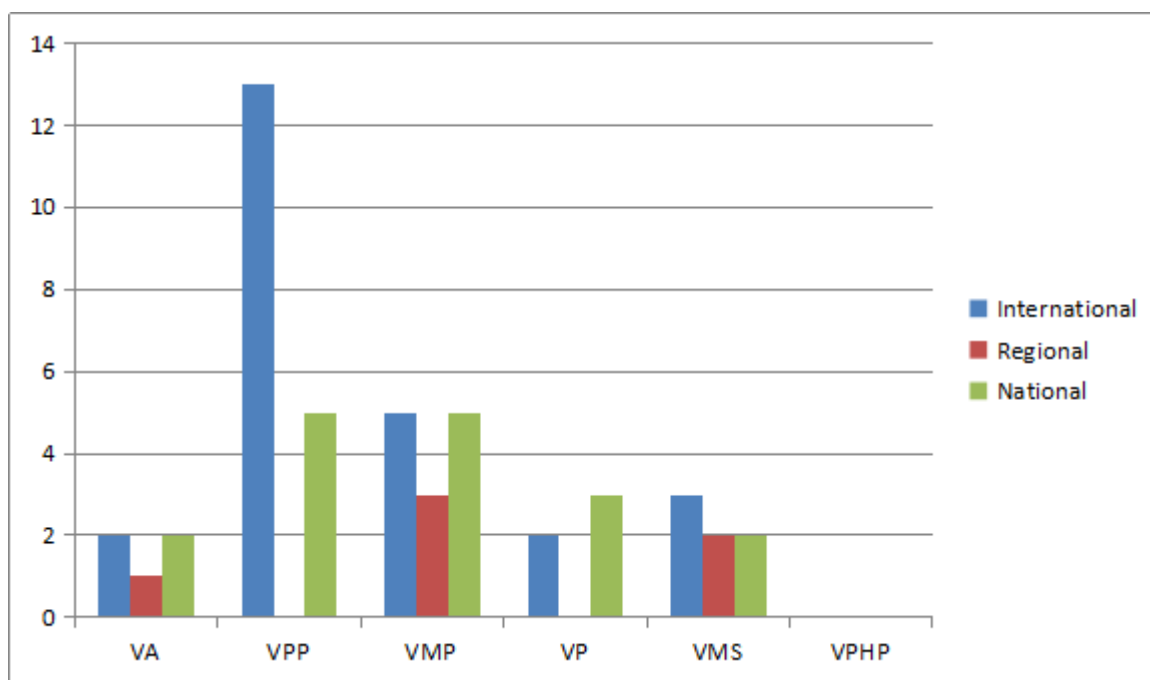

CHAPTER VI

REPORTS FROM UNITS, INSTITUTES AND CENTRES.

INTERNAL AUDIT

PREAMBLE

The internal Audit is a Directorate under the Vice Chancellor's office saddled with the responsibility of ensuring that controls put in place by Management are adhered to. Both the financial and non-financial aspects of the University are constantly being reviewed to ensure compliance with the policies, plans, procedures, extant rules, financial regulations etc. which would have significant improvement on the quality of the operations of the university.

The Directorate carries out both pre and post payment auditing of all activities of the university. The Directorate ensures safeguarding of university assets by verifying the existence of such assets and insisting on the recording of the Asset into the Asset Register, domiciling in every College, Department, Directorate, Centre and Unit and inscribing the name of the university on all procured Assets.

It appraises the economy and efficiency with which financial resources are deployed through the price intelligence monitoring unit by which wastages of funds through over-invoicing are being curtailed.

As a Directorate, we seek to add value to the University system by giving qualitative advice to Management to assist in the efficiency, effectiveness and corporate governance of the University through our Audit reports.

The activities of the Directorate revolve round the following Units:

- i. Treasury, Personal Accounts and Payment Systems Audit Unit.
- ii. Payroll and Personal Emolument Audit Unit.
- iii. College Finance Audit Unit.
- iv. Cost & Investment Centers Audit Unit.
- v. Price Intelligence Monitoring Unit.
- vi. Special Centers Audit Unit.
- vii. Performance, Evaluation/Budget Implementation & Expenditure Control Audit Unit.
- viii. INHURD Audit Unit.

Projects Executed/Major Activities

During the year under review, some of the achievements are as highlighted below:

- i. The micro-electronic Audit of the financial activities of CEADESE was successfully carried out
- ii. Sponsorship of Staff to selected Workshops organized by the Anti-Corruption Academy of Nigeria ICPC and GIFMIS Workshop by the office of Accountant General of the Federation;
- iii. Through the efforts of the Price Intelligence and Monitoring Unit, the Directorate was able to save for the University significant amount of money through the adjustment of price estimates of goods and services to reflect the current market price. This ensured financial prudence and prevents loss of scarce financial resources of the university;
- iv. The cost and investment centers were closely monitored by Auditors to ensure judicious use of scarce resources, by reporting on areas where losses are recorded. Areas where profits are made were also reported in order to keep the management abreast of the information about their operations.

- v. The Directorate ensures that officers who collected cash advance executes jobs/assignments for which such advances were released and proper accountability is rendered through prompt retirement.
- vi. The Directorate carries out pre and post payment AUDIT of ALL payment vouchers to confirm their completeness, accuracy and correctness
- vii. The Directorate had auditors assigned to each College, Directorate, Department and Units within the University. All purchases are verified by Internal Auditors after confirming the prices of same from Price Intelligence Monitoring Unit and ensuring that Store Receipt Voucher and store issue voucher are issued for proper accounting documentation.
- viii. All Assets purchased by Colleges, Directorates, Departments and Units were verified, ensuring that such assets were inscribed with university name and recorded in the departmental Asset Register.
- ix. The INHURD Audit team is strengthened by the deployment of two Audit staff to carry out all audit activities by making sure that due diligence is carried out while due process is observed in all financial activities.
- x. In the award of various projects, the Directorate ensure that:
 - (1) the process was right
 - (2) the Winner was right
 - (3) the Cost was right

Before the payment vouchers were passed for payment, the stage of completion in line with the Certificate issued by the consultant would be verified by Auditors.

Generally, we ensured that financial transactions were carried out in accordance with Financial Regulations and extant Treasury Circulars.

- xi. New Auditors were employed during the period under review in order to strengthen the staff profile and ensure adequate coverage of all University financial activities.

PROJECTION FOR 2020

The Directorate of Internal Audit aim at improving on the achievements of the previous year 2019, while efforts will be geared towards introducing new audit techniques to ensure that the synergy between the Directorate and the University community is achieved to such a level that the University Community will see the directorate as partners in progress working together to move our university forward to a greater height.

In the light of the above, the Directorate intends to carry out the following:

1. To implement the Approved Audit plan for year 2020.
2. To attend to all enquiries and requests timely, the Directorate has formed a WhatsApp group to attend to Deans, Directors and Heads of Departments/Units for the price verification of their purchases and other issues.
3. To ensure safe guarding of University Assets by insisting on inscribing the University name on assets procured/acquired.

4. To keep on educating the University community on the functions and duties of the Internal Audit Directorate as Management arm, saddled with the responsibility of internal controls.
5. To constantly interact with the Deans, Directors, Head of Departments, and Head of Units regarding correct procedure to follow in making requests from their votes.
6. To monitor the procurement process of the University in line with the Federal Government Regulations and extant circulars.
7. Advice Management from time to time on the improvement of Internal Controls and ensuring compliance by staff members.

BIOTECHNOLOGY CENTRE

Introduction

The Biotechnology Centre was set up in 2000 as part of the Equipment Maintenance Centre in response to the 1st Summer Course on In-vitro recombinant DNA techniques held at the University. It was elevated to the status of full-fledged Centre in the year 2001 with the Second Summer Course that started focusing on PCR techniques. The Centre was set up to provide Central Molecular Biology facilities for all academic departments in the University, and to drive capacity building in the area of Biotechnology applications in the University and beyond. The Centre is empowered to carry out research and advise the University on all matters pertaining to modern biotechnology, and to create awareness on its utilization for the benefit of man, his crops and livestock. The vision of the Centre is to be a Centre of Excellence for Biotechnology Applications, Training and Research in Nigeria and the West African sub-region.

Major Activities

The major activities within the Centre is performed at the following laboratories:

- Tissue Culture and Plant Transformation Laboratory: among the crops that we work on include Plantain, Cassava, Cowpea and Tomato.
- Plant Genome Laboratory: DNA extraction and PCR analysis are carried out in this laboratory. Laboratory equipment that are available includes Thermocyclers, q-PCR, Nanodrop, Electrophoresis Gel apparatus etc.
- Animal Genome Laboratory: similar work as plant genome laboratory is carried out except that they used different sample like blood, tissues and organs.
- Food Biotechnology and Analytical Laboratory: is equipped with HPLC, GC, ELISA for analyzing food borne pathogens, microbes and toxins.
- Atomic Absorption Spectrometry Laboratory: Analyses of various elements in plants, foods, soil, water samples and other environmental pollution samples are carried out.
- Bioinformatics Laboratory: Gene alignment, Blasting, Primer designing, Protein Structural and Enzyme position determination are the major activities in this laboratory.
- Wet Laboratory: Digestion of cations as well as protein analysis from soil and plant tissue is done. The laboratory is equipped with Soxhlet apparatus, Kjedal machine etc.
- **Collaborations**
- The Centre has an existing collaboration with International Centre for Genetic Engineering and Biotechnology (ICGEB), Trieste, Italy.
- A Collaboration with JR Biotek Foundation (UK) was established in 2017 in the area of training and capacity building, to facilitate knowledge and technical expertise in molecular laboratory techniques and its various beneficial applications, especially in Agriculture.
- The Centre also initiated a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with ILRI BecA- Hub in Kenya in 2017.

CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE IN AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT AND SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENT (CEADESE)

Overview of the College/School/Centre

The Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta was awarded the Centre of Excellence in Agriculture in 2013 after a competitive application for the establishment of Centre of Excellence in the West-African/Central African Sub-region. The Centre is focused on Teaching, Learning and Research excellence in Agricultural Productivity in the face of Climate Change challenges. To achieve these objectives, we developed Post-graduate Curricula leading to Master and Doctoral Degrees in Agricultural Development and Sustainable Environment in response to specific productivity challenges; Short-term Skill Acquisition for industry stakeholders; specialized workshops; and internships.

- Development of a green house unit for optimally cultivating Onion in Abeokuta, SW Nigeria.

The Centre is partnering with 18 regional and 13 international Centre's on more than 100 postgraduate research projects in six West African countries that will be conducted with up-to-date research facilities. Some of which includes; Agency for Quality Assurance through Accreditation of Study Programs (AQAS), Germany; Dept. of Science Education, University of Copenhagen, Denmark; Perigrine Leadership Institutes and Academic Services, Gillette, Wyoning and Galilee International Management Institute, Israel.

DIRECTORATE OF ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

HISTORY AND MANDATE

The Directorate of Environmental Management of the University started as Parks and Garden Unit at the inception of the University's relocation to the Permanent site, Alabata in 1995. This was borne out of the recognition that the University's landscape needed to be adorned with beautiful flowers. The Unit metamorphosed to be known as Environmental Management Unit (EMU) from 2007 to April, 2011 with the rapid expansion of the physical landscape of the University, the need to broaden and consolidate the environmental management became important and this led to the creation of the Directorate of Environmental Management in May, 2011.

VISION AND MISSION

Vision: To transform the University Landscape into one of the most beautiful and healthy campuses in the world

Mission: To efficiently utilize human and material resource to develop and enhance the natural and physical landscape of the University campus towards achieving a neat, healthy and aesthetic environment, conducive for learning, research and social wellbeing of all within the University Community.

ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATIONAL ACTIVITIES

The Directorate of Environmental Management (DEM) for administrative function and control is headed by a **Director** and it has two major distinct Units that deliver the Directorate's Vision and mission statements.

PARKS AND GARDENS UNIT : The Unit is responsible for Plant Nursery Establishment and Maintenance, planning the Establishment and Maintenance of Landscaping projects (lawns, hedges, trees, shrubs, walkways, kerbs) and Parks Establishment, Trees and Landscape Management, providing recreation and leisure grounds for students, staff, and the University Community at large through development of Open spaces, Parks and Gardens, Grant permit for the usage of designated Open space, Parks and Gardens managed and maintained by the Directorate, Provide training and development through Workshops, Seminars and collaboration with students and the general public on landscape management, plant Nursery, operations, and related environmental topics.

SANITATION UNIT: The Unit is responsible for waste management, Building Cleaning, Drainage and Road Cleaning, Fumigation and Pest Control.

MAJOR ACTIVITIES IN 2019

Parks and Gardens Unit

1. Management of about 500- 600 developed hectares of the University land of 10,200 hectares.
2. Raising and tethering of plant materials at the Plant Nursery.
3. Planting of Tress and raising of assorted potted plants at the University Library for the fulfillment of its master plan.
4. Planting of additional trees on the University landscape.
5. Landscaping of the New Male and Female Hostels in 2018/2019.
6. Establishment of Plant lettering at COPLANT.
7. Felling of trees at COLERM Meteorological station that had been obstructing the station for the College accreditation programme.

The implementation arrangement of the Directorate is through Zoning of the University campus into five (5) large operational Zones from seventeen (17) Zones due to manpower shortages with casual workforce of 73 from 155 in May 2018 for Parks and Garden Unit.

Sanitation Unit

1. Routine Cleaning of University Buildings and Environment through the supervision of Cleaning Contractors,
2. Evacuation and Disposal of Solid Waste on Campus
3. Control of insects and harmful reptiles within the University Campus
4. Providing of fumigation services to the University Community
5. Cleaning of Roads and Drainages
6. Sanitary inspection of food vendors and other related handlers

The implementation arrangement of the Directorate is through Zoning of the University campus into two large operational Zones for Sanitation Unit.

COLLABORATIONS

The Directorate during the year under review through its Parks and Garden Unit, collaborated with various Plant Departments of the University including Horticulture Department and Applied Botany College of Plant Science and Crop Production (COPLANT) and College of Biological Sciences (COLBIOS) respectively for hands-on practical training of students to Plant Management, Landscaping and ground Management, plant Nursery Establishment and Management, tools and Equipment and machinery handling and ornamental plant identification. A total of about 84 students from Horticulture Department for HRT 507 Practical Training and 15 students from Applied Botany Department for Industrial Attachment Programme (SIWES). Also some Cambridge A level students from Institute for Human Resources Management (INHURD) also paid a practical visit to the Directorate in the year under review on plant identification.

PROJECTION FOR 2020

1. Procurement of New Equipment and machines such as slashers, mowers, brush cutters, chain saws , spraying pumps, Cleaning equipment, tools and other operational materials.
2. Landscaping of Newly completed Buildings in the University
3. Landscaping of fence line areas of students hostels and Executive Lodges to ease security surveillance on Campus
4. Improvement on the parking spaces in Colleges and offices to avoid indiscriminate parking on lawns
5. Procurement of specialized equipment for the Directorate Fumigation team
6. Procurement of specialized waste equipment and materials
7. to transform the University Landscape and environment to one of the beautiful Campus in the world in 2020

CONCLUSION

Despite the operational constraints of obsolete and inadequate equipment and machinery, man power, supply of fuel and lubricants to power machines, water supply, budgetary allocation, the Directorate was still able to discharge her duties in making the University an enviable one among other Universities in Nigeria in the year under review.

The Directorate of University Farms (DUFARMS)

The Directorate provides Support Services and Facilities for the conduct of Staff and Students' Research projects. It also maintains for the College of Animal Science and Livestock Production (COLANIM) the different stocks of Livestock to meet the National Universities Commission (NUC) accreditation requirements.

The Directorate is complemented by a production Unit for the commercial production of basic crops and livestock commodities to further project the status of the Agricultural University which FUNAAB is; thus offering commercial and industrial exposure to students. It serves to contribute to the Internally Generated Revenue (IGR) portfolio of the University through the sales of these commodities to the community.

A. Teaching and Research.

a. Crops

The Departments and Centres for which services were provided this year were: Crop Protection, Horticulture, Soil science and Land Management, Plant Breeding and Seed Technology and Plant Physiology and Crop Production. Others are Food Science and Technology (COLHFEC) and Agricultural Media Resource and Extension Centre. A total of 13.62 hectares of land was prepared for research work.

With the support of the University Management and the new machinery provided, full Mechanization of Maize and Soybean cultivation (Except Harvesting) was achieved in 2019. 29.5 Hectares of maize was cultivated. 14.5 was harvested and sold as fresh cobs, from which a revenue of N1,431,050 (One Million Four Hundred and Thirty One Thousand and Fifty Naira was generated) The balance of 15 Hectares was harvested dry and stored in the maize cribs constructed. These are currently being threshed and already about 12 tonnes of dry grain has been bagged, with much yet un-threshed. It is heartwarming that steps are already being taken by the University Management to purchase a Combine Harvester (for harvesting Maize and Soybean) for the Directorate this season.

3.5 Hectares of Soybean was planted. The crop has been harvested and undergoing threshing for grains.

Ten Hectares of Cassava was planted in 2019. The crops are 4 months old and would be due for harvesting from September 2020. It is noteworthy that the planting operation was mechanized with the use of a Mechanical Cassava Planter purchased by the University and delivered to the Directorate earlier in the year. Similarly a Cassava Harvesting machine has also been handed over to the Directorate for the harvesting of the crop when due.

The Council Farm

The Council Farm is designed and laid out to be a model Demonstration Farm. Establishment of the Farm commenced with the Management's approval of the concept late 2018 and early 2019. It is a Two-Hectare piece where all crop enterprises undertaken by DUFARMS shall be showcased on the various plots therein.

Those crop commodities already established on the farm include Pineapple, Plantain, Pawpaw, Cassava, Maize, Soybean, Cowpea and some Medicinal plants. It is complemented by a Market Garden plot on which a Drip Irrigation system has been installed, to grow Horticultural or Home Garden crops, particularly in the dry season.

Though yet to be fully developed, it is hoped that by the by the 2020 season, the concept would be fully manifested and would serve as a place for University official visitors as well as those on excursion (particularly students) as a one stop Centre to view our cropping activities on the larger farm.

The major challenge for the council farm at the moment is a water source for the Drip Irrigation system installed. It was believed a well would serve the purpose, but it was discovered the entire area has underlying rocky terrain preventing the sinking of a well. In this regard, a request shall be made for the sinking of a borehole to provide water for the Drip Kit tank.

Support to COBFAS.

Some of the newly acquired equipment mentioned above (Grains Planter, Boom Sprayer) were made available to COBFAS for the establishment of their Maize, Soybeans crop farms on campus.

Also, with the new approach to students' practical training introduced by the new Director of the Centre students are deployed to the different enterprises of DUFARM in rotation to enrich their practical exposure and training; thus fulfilling in more details the aims of the one year program.

Livestock

Poultry Layer Stock

Following the culling of the last batch of Layer birds as Old Layers another batch of 500 Layers were stocked 3rd June 2019. Breed is Isa Brown, received at Point-of-Lay, at 16 weeks of age. Cost of birds was N1,400 each (N700,000 for the entire stock).

So far, in their 20 weeks of laying, Revenue realized from eggs sales to date is N1,282,500.

Broilers

Broiler production was undertaken twice in 2019, at Easter and at Christmas festivities. Five Hundred and Forty Seven Three Hundred Naira (N547,300) was released for the production of 300 Broilers for sales at Easter. This was successfully undertaken and at the end of the exercise, gross revenue was N687,500 paid into the University's IGR.

1000 Day Old Chicks were collected 28th October 2019 for the Christmas Broilers production. N1,765,600 was released for the project. These were successfully raised with only 3.4% mortality recorded). Sales commenced 20th December. By year end 939 birds had been sold and N2,589,700 realized as revenue giving a net income of N824,100 in excess of our expenses even with 25 birds yet unsold.

Fisheries

Money released for rearing of Catfish for smoking and sales could not be utilized in 2018 as the period of the release was too close to the dry season when continuous availability of water in the DUFARM' ponds could not be guaranteed. However, as already planned, the utilization of the fund commenced in April 2019. They were reared in two tranches for ease of marketing, to be undertaken sequentially. Both production exercises were successful. From the N356,550 provided, proceeds of the sales of smoked catfish produced was N429,950.

Two of the Dug-out ponds in the Directorate are currently being utilized to raise Tilapia and Catfish fingerlings recovered from one other pond within the area. These, we hope would be ready for cropping by January 2020.

DIRECTORATE OF HEALTH SERVICES

Introduction

The Health Services has been in existence since the inception of the University. The Clinic at inception offered out-patient services only and run single shift. Later, the Clinic introduced two shifts, with four bed observation rooms (2) for fairly serious cases. In 1996, the Health Centre introduced 24 hours service. Support services include Medical Laboratory, Pharmacy, Medical Records, Laundry/Cleaning Services.

a. Major Activities

University Health Services' mandate is to give qualitative health care to students, staff and staff dependants, within the context of Primary Health Care. It is also the duty of Health Services to oversee the environmental health of the institution. The Health Centre also offers Family Planning Service, Free Health Counseling, Free Tuberculosis and Leprosy Service and has Voluntary Counseling and Testing Centre for HIV, where test is conducted free among others. The Health Services has continued to make clearly evident impact on the University healthcare and environmental health, with attention on the students and staff, with a 24 hour coverage.

The hub of activity of the Health Services is located within the University Health Centre (UHC). The UHC is the fourth structure located on the left hand side of the Ceremonial Road after leaving the University's main gate. The UHC has on its frontage the ambulance park with two (2) standby ambulance vehicles (operated by a pool of drivers). The UHC then has immediately after the ambulance park the Emergency Room with good illumination, suction machine, ECG machine, oxygen concentrator, face mask, and of course emergency tray and the Treatment Room.

There are also within the UHC:

Eight (8) Consulting Rooms, well stocked Pharmacy with drugs and well trained, qualified personnel, well equipped Laboratory, with qualified personnel, HIV Care, Voluntary and Counseling and Reproductive Health, a spacious Waiting Room - with DSTV access for waiting clients. It also serves as the venue for Health Education and Instructions by the health workers.

There is also a Conference Room for weekly/bimonthly Clinical Presentation, Ward - Bedded for Male and Females with toilet facilities, Security Post - at least two (2) security men monitoring the activities in and around the Centre round the clock, TB Clinic/Direct Observation Therapy (DOT) Room for counseling, testing and monitoring chest infection in the community. The German foundation assisted with this.

- b. Re-spacing of the library, creating conducive environment for reading and learning
- c. Employment of 46 indigent students on student work scheme
- d. A University-wide training of final year students on information sourcing and digital literacy for the students
- e. Training of final year students from COLANIM and COLVET on the use of Electronic Information Resources

- f. The Library's Facebook page has also been active and engaged by staff and the students
- g. An instagram (nimbeadedipe) page has been created to sensitise the university community on the services and resources of the library
- h. Two e-resources data-bases named Springer/Nature and Proquest were added to the Electronic Resources collection of the Library while Ebscohost was renewed making the number of e-resources available to the University community increase to eight.
- i. Latest editions of textbooks (from 2017-2019) covering all courses in the University were acquired for the use of the community.
- j. The Library also held the maiden edition of eminent personality lecture on April 3rd 2019 with Papa Jonathan OlusesanDipeolu (The Pioneer University Librarian University of Ife) as our Eminent Personality Lecturer.
- k. Likewise, an international Conference on Library and Information Science was hosted by the library this year bringing various informationprofessionals together to deliberate on their common goals.

FUNAAB RADIO

2019: A YEAR OF CONSOLIDATION

Indeed, the year 2019 has been a year of consolidation for FUNAAB Radio. After a 10-year wait, owing to regulatory hurdles, the dream of the University to establish and sustain a broadcast outfit that will enhance stakeholders and campus communication, eventually came to fruition during the current Administration of Prof. Felix KolawoleSalako.

FUNAAB Radio (the sound of abundance) made history on Monday, March 26, 2018 when it eventually blared into the airwaves to flag-off terrestrial transmission via its assigned frequency, **89.5FM**, to the delight of all.

It is very significant to mention that the current Vice-Chancellor, Professor Salako played very key roles in the making of FUNAAB Radio at three different but critical junctions of the University's voyage in respect of the radio project.

First, as Director of the Agricultural Media Resources and Extension Centre (AMREC), Professor Salako initiated and developed the blueprint with which the Committee on FUNAAB Radio worked upon. Later, Professor Salako simply amplified his contributions when he became the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Development in 2011 with FUNAAB Radio directly under his ambit of supervision.

It is also remarkable that FUNAAB Radio became an instant success in the first few weeks and months of operation to the extent that in July 2018, the station, after being granted a full commercial transmission status by the National Broadcasting Commission (NBC), has passed the test of viability.

So far, FUNAAB Radio is truly living up to its vision of aspiring to be the leading broadcast station with excellence and professionalism, providing an interface for knowledge, information and entertainment. The station, operating purely as a training centre for students to develop their broadcast potentials, have been performing the feat of seamless Live Transmission of major official events of the University.

Despite the above articulated catalogue of achievements, it is expedient and worthy of note that even towards the tail end of 2019, FUNAAB Radio, with the support of the Management, in particular, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor KolawoleSalako and the Chairman of Board of Directors of FUNAAB Radio and Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Development), Prof. Clement Adeofun and his team has recorded fresh impact that is geared towards taking the Radio Station to the next level in the last two months that Mr. Kola Adepoju assumed office as the Coordinator of "**the Sound of Abundance**", following his redeployment from the Directorate of Public Relations.

These include redeployment of five new staff, thus increasing the radio station staff strength from three (3) to eight (8).

Better still, auditioning has been conducted for about 120 prospective student volunteers, out of which twenty-five (25) have been meritoriously selected by the attendant panel to replace the ten students volunteers that are going on national service early next year.

Similarly, in the last two months FUNAAB Radio has improved the quality of the content of its programmes and visibility by attracting top influential members of the society to its programmes, thereby increasing astronomically the numbers of callers to its programmes.

Lastly, in the year under review, FUNAAB Radio has generated the sum of **One Million, Six Hundred and Seventy Thousand Naira (N1,670,000.00)** into the University's coffer.

We are unshaking in our conviction that with the steady support of Management and other relevant stakeholders, FUNAAB Radio will move to an unprecedented height in the year 2020.

INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY RESOURCE CENTRE (ICTREC)

ICTREC is the professional service Centre that coordinates all Information and Communication Technology (ICT) related activities of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta (FUNAAB). The Centre has been proactive and played participatory roles by deploying, managing and supporting ICT solutions/services to improve administrative procedures/processes, learning and delivery of the FUNAAB's tripod mandate of Teaching, Research and Extension.

ICTREC footprints cut across various operations (i.e. teaching, payment, admission, registration, examination, results, hostel allocation) and sectors (academic, registry, bursary/audit) of the University community.

Some of the activities/projects carried out by the Centre during the year under review include:

- Increase in University's Internet Bandwidth from 2 STM-1 to 3 STM-1 (i.e. 310 Mbps – 465 Mbps) thereby making it possible for staff to enjoy 5 GB of data per month
- Expansion of University's Network through laying of fibre-optic cable and connecting the underlisted offices to the MainHub ICT Data Centre:
 - Unity Building A and B
 - Pension Building
 - Audit/PR Building
- Activation of MainHub to 250 Computer Lab
- Linking of 250 Computer Lab to 500 Computer Lab via Fibre-Optic for ease of Examination
- Creation of Fibre MiniHub at the Green Area (i.e. PGSchool, COLFHEC, BIOTECH and MAHMOUD Buildings)
- Direct Fibre connection with our main bandwidth provider (MainOne) and this has improved University's internet uptime to 99.9%
- The Centre also played a pivotal role towards the success of the 2019 NUC accreditation exercise
- Development of three (3) additional modules to the existing FUNAAB University Management Portal was also implemented.
 - Each Student can now print ePass (Exam Schedule) from his/her portal page with ease
 - eResult Document Management that takes care of Result approval workflow system, eResult document archiving and Missing score requests workflow
 - eRequest Management to handle rectification, add/delete and change of programme workflow was also included in the new module
- Result notification to parents via emails as registered on the portal by their children/wards
- ICTREC was fully involved in the multimedia presentation of the Electronic-Senate (eSenate)

PART-TIME DEGREE PROGRAMME

Part-Time Degree Programme in Brief

The Part- Time Degree Programme (PTDP) was established in the year 2007 as one of the substantive programmes run under the coordination of the Institute for Human Resources Development (INHURD). The Programme started operation with nine (9) Degree Programmes across six (6) Colleges of the University. Currently the Part-Time Degree Programme runs 27 Degree Programmes across eight (8) Colleges. Part-Time Degree Programme is presently domiciled in Academic Planning Unit under the Office of the Vice-Chancellor.

Philosophy/Goal of the Programme

The Primary Philosophy that guides the training of students in PTDP is the production of graduates with adequate skill and sound knowledge as well as entrepreneurial ability. It also enhances proper utilization of human resources for gainful employment within their limited time, or elevates them in the chosen careers at their various work places.

Part-Time Degree Programme Policy

The Part-Time Degree Programme Policy of the Federal University of Agriculture, Abeokuta is designed to ensure excellence and integrity in the conduct of the Programmes:

SIWES DIRECTORATE

Preamble

Students Industrial Work Experience Scheme (SIWES) is part of the approved Benchmark Minimum Academic Standards (BMAS) for SIWES-approved undergraduate degree programmes in Nigerian Universities. It is a planned and structured scheme with specific career objectives geared towards developing participants' occupational competencies; and also prepare them for post-graduation real work situations.

1.0. COLLABORATION

The Directorate has the mandate to co-ordinate the acquisition of Relevant Production Skills (RPSs) of students and their Industrial Training, in order to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge acquired in the classroom and actual practice in the industrial world.

The Directorate of SIWES, FUNAAB operates in collaboration with the National Universities Commission (NUC), the SIWES Division of the Industrial Training Fund (ITF); the Industries/Organizations where students acquire relevant skills and experiences; and the Students.

2.0. MAJOR ACTIVITIES OF THE SIWES DIRECTORATE INCLUDE:

- 2.1. Provision of avenues for students in the University to acquire industrial skills and experiences relevant to their course of study.
- 2.2. Provision of students with an opportunity to apply acquired theoretical knowledge in real work situations, thereby bridging the gap between knowledge and practice.
- 2.3. Preparation of students for the work situation they will meet post-graduation.
- 2.4. Exposure of students to work methods and techniques of handling equipment/machinery that may not be available in the Institutions.
- 2.5. Making transition from school to the world of work easier and enhance students' contacts and networking for post-qualification job placement.
- 2.6. Enlisting and strengthening employers' involvement in the entire educational process of preparing University graduates for employment and industry.
- 2.7. Preparation and Submission of Master and Placement lists to NUC and ITF.
- 2.8. Sourcing and placement of students on attachment with employers.
- 2.9. Placement of students on attachment with employers; and working out tailor- made training programmes with the industry-based supervisors.

- 2.10. Organization of orientation Programmes for students preparatory to Industrial Training in collaboration with ITF training officials and other relevant resource persons.
- 2.11. Supervision of students on Industrial Training.
- 2.12. Vetting of students' log-books preparatory to ITF verification.
- 2.13. Assessment and grading of students' performance in conjunction with respective academic Departments.
- 2.14. Collation and submission of ITF form 8 to ITF Area Office at the end of each session.
- 2.15. Facilitation of verification of students' log book by ITF officials.
- 2.16. Facilitation and follow-up of Electronic Payments of students' Industrial Training (IT) Allowances by ITF into individual student's bank account.
- 2.17. Facilitation and follow-up of Electronic Payments of Supervisory Allowance by ITF to the University.
- 2.18. Participation in and presentation of progress reports at quarterly meetings with the ITF Area office and SIWES Directors/Coordinators of other tertiary institutions in Ogun State.
- 2.19. Participation in ITF- organized Workshops, Seminars and Conferences as relevant and appropriate.
- 2.20. Compilation of comprehensive reports on the SIWES scheme to the ITF at the end of each session.

3.0. MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2019

3.1. *SIWES Directorate's Leadership*

The former Director of FUNAAB-SIWES, Prof. Grace Sokoya successfully completed her tenure on September 21, 2018 and formally handed over to Prof. Francisca George on September 23, 2018 as the new Director.

3.2. *Mobilization of students for Industrial Training (IT) and Community Based Farming Scheme (COBFAS)*

SIWES orientation was held at the beginning of the 2018/19 Academic session for Agricultural students in May, 2019; and for Non-Agricultural students between 23rd and 25th September, 2019. A total of two thousand, four hundred and sixty seven (2,467) students were mobilized for IT in relevant organizations/industries; and agricultural training for Agriculture students in FUNAAB-COBFAS communities during the current academic session.

3.3. *SIWES Industrial Training Supervision*

Students are being duly supervised by the respective course lecturers and the SIWES Directorate in their respective placement locations, including Government and Non-

Governmental Organizations, Industries and the four Community Based Farming Scheme (COBFAS) locations (Ishaga-Orile, IwoyeKetu, Odogbolu and Ikorodu.

3.4. ***Verification of Students' Log-Books***

All students' logbooks for the 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 Academic Sessions were presented to ITF by the current Director, Prof. Francisca George; and duly verified in October, 2018 and May, 2019 respectively.

3.5. ***Compilation of 2019 Master and Placement List***

The Master and Placement lists of students on SIWES during 2018/2019 academic session have been compiled and sent to NUC Abuja and the ITF Headquarter, Jos respectively.

3.6. ***Payment of Students' Industrial Training Allowances***

The 2016/2017 and 2017/2018 students IT allowances were paid during the period under review. There were complaints by some students regarding non-payment of their allowances.

Batch A list of names of such students have been duly forwarded to ITF Jos headquarters, through the Abeokuta Area office, to facilitate payment; while the Batch B is being compiled for subsequent submission.

The Directorate is following up on this with the Abeokuta Area Office through phone-calls, visits and letters.

3.7. ***Payment of SIWES Supervisory Allowances***

Table 1 shows the schedule of payment of Supervisory allowances.

ITF has been duly notified of outstanding balances and is working with the University to offset all outstanding allowances.

3.11. *Collaboration with Other SIWES Stakeholders*

The Directorate developed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with two Organizations during the period of this report namely:

- (i) *EttehAro& Partners* – an infrastructural development Company domiciled in Ibadan, Oyo State. The Company pledged to employ FUNAAB's engineering students as IT Interns, with possibility of being offered tenure appointment after graduation.
- (ii) *Aquatic Hub Afrique Network* – The network is owned by the University's Alumnus, Steve Okeleji. The Network is working on a program tagged “**Bridging the gap between the Gown and the Town**” and will be engaging students of Aquaculture and Fisheries Management, Pure and Applied Zoology and other interested students during their SIWES Programmes.

3.12. *Stakeholders' Forum*

The Dean is supported by the Deputy Dean Professor T. A. Shittu and the Student Affairs Officer Mr. S.O. Adeniran.

The Division has three (3) administrative units: The Counselling Unit, The hostel and the General Administration.

The Division has also continuously engage the leadership of the student Union to address their complaints early enough to avert major disagreements.

6.0 PROTECTION OF STUDENTS FROM SEXUAL OR ANY FORM OF HARASSMENT

The University Management has zero-tolerance for indiscipline at any level. Hence, adequate measures are put in place to prevent and deal with cases of sexual or any other form of harassment. It is interesting to note that the University, to a very large extent, is noted for having good students with a high standard of academic and moral status.

7.0 Student Union Election

The 2018/2019 student union elections were conducted in the year under review and were supervised by the Student Affairs Division. The Division however did not interfere in the conduct of the election. The exercise was ensured to be free, fair, transparent and acceptable by all stakeholders.

8.0 Youth Organization Support

During the years under reference, the Division encouraged the selfless contributions and services to humanity rendered by the Man-O-war, Road Safety and Nigerian Red Cross Society to the entire University community. Through the support of the Division, these organizations were adequately encouraged.

9.0 BURSARY AND SCHOLARSHIP

Processing of Bursary and Scholarship for students is an integral part of activities carried out in the Student Affairs Division.

All issues relating to Bursary and Scholarship are given utmost attention including generation of list of potential students for the awards. During the period under review, the following scholarship were awarded to the students: The Federal Scholarship, MTN Scholarship, Egba

Indigent based in UK Scholarship, Lasal foundation Scholarship award scheme for indigent students, Niger-Delta commission scholarship e.t.c

10.0 MOBILIZATION OF CORPS MEMBERS

The pre-mobilization of qualified graduates of the University for NYSC programme is done in the Student Affairs Division. The Division carries out this important assignment with integrity and transparency. With the support of the University Management, the University has no backlog of qualified graduates yet to be mobilized.

It is interesting to note that the name of the University has not featured in any of the NYSC lists of Institutions with observed lapses in presentation of master list of graduates for mobilization or any other illegalities being perpetrated in some Institutions.

Rather, the University has always been commended for a job well done.

Vision: To provide prompt and excellent veterinary services to all our clients in the areas of poultry, food and companion animal medicine and surgery, diagnostic services, consultancy and to provide both training and research support to the College of Veterinary Medicine, the University and the entire nation.

Mandate:

Education

- Training veterinarians for primary-care practice and preparing them for advanced study.
- Communicating advances to graduate veterinarians through continuing education.
- Educating the public and the government about links between animal and public health.

Research

- Obtaining new knowledge necessary to improve animal and public health through research at all levels.
- Creating innovative healing and teaching methods and discovering new clinical interventions and diagnostic methods.

Service

- Improving the health of agricultural- and laboratory-animal populations and animal patients through service in the teaching hospitals, diagnostic laboratories and field services.
- We hope to be the leading referral centre for both food and companion animal cases in the South-western part of Nigeria.

Location

The Veterinary Teaching Hospital, FUNAAB operated from the Isale-Igbein clinic between January, 2005 and December, 2014. The Veterinary Teaching Hospital complex at the campus began operation in January, 2015 alongside the Isale-Igbein clinic. At the end of December, 2015, the Isale-Igbein clinic was closed down making the hospital to only operate from its Veterinary Complex inside the campus. Annexe at Kenta Housing Estate, Idi- Aba was opened in August, 2018

Present Facilities:

Currently, the VTH has middle grade facilities for diagnostic imaging (radiography and ultrasonography), laboratory diagnosis (clinical pathology, morbid anatomy and clinical microbiology) and a well-equipped small animal theatre. The VTH is housed in a state of the art Veterinary complex situated behind the college.

Staffing:

The Veterinary Teaching Hospital currently has three veterinary officers, two animal health superintendents, one pharmacy technician, one laboratory scientist and a number of administrative and supporting staffs. In addition, consultants and registrars from the college assist in both training and provision of services.

Consultants

- The consultants are responsible for all the cases presented to their respective specialty areas.
- They provide leadership, as well as train the Resident Veterinarians under them.
- Consultants ensure that they have case reviews in their specialty area at least once in a week so as to provide platform for training and be current with the development in their specialty areas.
- Consultants sign all reports that are leaving their specialty areas.

Residents/Registrars

- The Registrars work with the hospital staff to ensure adequate and prompt veterinary care for all patients.
- Registrars notify the Consultant in his/ her specialty area as soon as a case is received and obtain necessary instruction before the case shall be discharge.
- All Registrars participate in the weekly reviews in his or her specialty area.
- Registrars also carry out all other duties that the clinical head or the consultant in his specialty area might assign.

Revenue Generation

Apart from being an academic centre for the clinical training of undergraduate and postgraduate students, the Veterinary Teaching Hospital also generate revenue to the University by offering services in the area of patient care, diagnostic and ambulatory services.

FUNAAB ZOO PARK

Introduction

FUNAAB Zoo Park is sitting on a 62 hectare land area just before the University Main gate, with exquisite scenic beauty and a natural derived Savannah and secondary forest environment. This makes FUNAAB Zoo Park one of the biggest and the best in the South-Western part of Nigeria.

The journey of the Park began in August, 2008, when a Committee on the Establishment of University Zoological Garden, was constituted, under the Chairmanship of Professor S.A. Onadeko, who eventually became the first Director of FUNAAB Zoo Park. The Park started operating from a temporary site, which is still part of the Zoo today.

The pioneer Director, Professor S.A. Onadeko served between October, 2011 and January, 2014. He was succeeded by Dr. O.M. Oyatogun, who served between February, 2014 and August, 2017. The current Director, Prof. O.A. Jayeola, was appointed on 16th August, 2017 for the first term and currently running a second term in office.

FUNAAB Zoo Park is a significant site for families, education and for conservation work. It displays native and exotic animal species in a near natural setting.

The aim of FUNAAB Zoo Park is to evolve as one of the best zoos, making waves in animal care, conservation, community and school education programmes, adopting best and sound business practices.

CHALLENGES ENCOUNTERED BY DIRECTORATE OF PHYSICAL PLANNING

The challenges encountered by the Physical Planning Unit in 2019

1. Time of release of Funds; the time of release of money for capital projects implementation is a major challenge in recent times for the success of projects. Since Due Process has to be observed in the release of funds for projects, it takes time for such allocations to be released. Since projects are time bound, this may lead to a delay in projects implementation. Also Due process stipulates that projects must have cash backing before commencement.
2. The fluctuations (economics locomotion) in the cost of building materials, equipment and labour cost pose a great challenge in the implementation of projects as the cost of these resources are high as a result of some uncontrolled and inevitable market factors/ forces.
3. The Allocation for Capital projects does not give room for a holistic developmental approach. Hence projects have to be scaled down in accordance with the allocation for phase development.
4. The limited Fund released by funding agencies constrains the expansion of infrastructure and services to meet up with development.
5. Multiple phasing of projects has caused delay in the full implementation of projects thereby stalling or extending the use to which the facility could be put. This has slowed down development.
6. There is need for staff training and re-training for capacity building of the Directorate to meet up with its diversified and multidisciplinary challenges.
7. The Directorate needs more logistics facilities such as utility vehicles, surveying instruments, Standard studio with modern printing sets, GPS and some basic construction materials etc. for staff efficiency.
8. There is need to provide the Directorate with instruments/equipment's for enhancement of duties, office automation by provision of appropriate software's such as GIS for Geo-spatial information and mapping, Laptops, GPS, Theodolite and other Surveying instruments, cost, design and project management softwares. In addition simple construction equipment such as mixers, barrows and other hand equipment would suffice for direct labour projects.
9. Inadequate office accommodation and meeting rooms especially with Consultants and Contractors on routine basis as demanded by project management and contract administration.

10. Inadequate safety measures for staff in view of the hazardous nature of work need to provide protective covers such as Raincoat, Boots, Herd helmets' face Screens and possibly special Insurance/Assurance cover etc.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Recommendation for effectiveness and efficiency of the Directorate of Physical Planning are as follow:-

- Need to review the University master plan.
- In the implementation of capital projects, priority should be given for the extension of infrastructures, services and amenities.
- Construction of a befitting building for the Directorate of Physical Planning in line with the 2014-2020 strategic plan.
- Staff training and re-training exercise should be continuous exercise for staff of the Directorate.
- More logistic facilities such as project utility vehicles, surveying instruments, standard studio with modern printing sets, laptops, GPS and other related construction equipment (full office automation and field instruments).
- Provision of safety wares and equipment for staff should be given utmost priority for the protection, effectiveness and efficiency of the staff.
